What a fantastic time to be an AAUW member in Redlands!

We are part of something big. With more than 200 members, we have one of the largest of the 140 branches in California, making us a powerful voice for women, which means opportunity.

This year especially we have an opportunity to increase our presence and impact in the community, sharing our mission, history, and projects as we stand in celebration: **This is our**

STEM Conference's (formerly known as the Math-Science Conference) 25-year milestone.

We are part of something meaningful. We have introduced models of successful women in STEM fields to about 15,000 girls in our community. I have a friend who majored in science at the University of Redlands because as an eighth-grader she was inspired at our conference. That day we changed the course of her life.

This year is also the nativity of the #MeToo era when we can shine a light on sexual harassment and finally know it will cast shame. Women are increasingly not offering a quiet response when asked to degrade themselves to get the job, the role, or the promotion. I'm proud to report that **our Public Policy group is organizing a community forum on sexual assault for this summer.**

We are part of a revolution. With one in five women being the target of sexual assault while in college, this is exactly the kind of timely and relevant project that makes being in our branch rewarding.

We are part of a capable team in Redlands, in California, and in National. AAUW National has a new CEO who is fired up about modernizing our organization, paring out the areas of redundancy so we can direct resources where we are most relevant. She is heaving our organization into the 21st century, taking advantage of what we can accomplish in the digital age, capitalizing on the

#### Public Policy Report: Supreme Court Rules in Favor of Fake Health Care Facilities

In a 6/26/18 ruling, the U.S. Supreme Court decided that fake health care facilities—referred to as crisis pregnancy centers—are not required to disclose relevant medical information to clients (National Institute of Family and Life Advocates (NIFLA) v. Becerra). The controversial case concerned a CA law that requires such facilities to disclose (through posted or printed materials) the availability of lowcost or free family planning services, prenatal care, and abortion services not provided by their facility, as well as disclosures if the facility and its staff are unlicensed. NIFLA challenged the law as a violation of free speech protected under the First Amendment while the State of CA argued that the law was necessary to provide women access to accurate information about reproductive health care, including abortion. Support for access to safe, legal abortion is at a record high, with about 7 in 10 Americans supporting the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 ruling in Roe Wade that found abortion to constitutionally protected. Among registered voters 53% nationally. of Republicans, 76% Independents, and 86% of Democrats oppose overturning Roe v. Wade. Trump voters oppose overturning Roe v. Wade by 6 points. The choice of the successor to replace retiring Justice Anthony Kennedy, who ruled with the 5-4 majority in NIFLA v. Becerra, will have a say in the health, education, and economic security of women and girls for decades to come. AAUW supports choice in the determination of one's reproductive life and takes the position that any nominee to the U.S. Supreme Court must be the result of meaningful bipartisan consultation, fully vetted by the Senate, and held accountable for any record of bias. 
#### **Public Policy Summer Forum**

This committee of dedicated AAUW members include Pat Belk, Rosa Gomez, Ann Harding, Jan Jacobson, Susan Miller, Dorothy Nordquist, Carolyn Ritchie, Susan Salzger, Susan Shodahl, Kathy Warren, and Beverly Woolverton.

**Tashana Lewis** knew her calling was to have a career in nursing. It all started as a teen in her neighborhood. She would soon carry the title of "village nurse" as she helped others by caring for minor cuts and bruises. As an eighteen-year-old, she embraced caring for her grandmother. With her caring, patience, and loving attitude, it was not difficult for her to dream of becoming a nurse. Tashana worked diligently for six years and completed

her nursing program. Soon after, she decided to enroll in the Master of Nursing. While enrolled in the program, she experienced challenges and had to postpone her dream. After the completion of the Master Program she enrolled at Loma Linda University in the Doctorate in Psychiatric Nursing. Because of her military background she plans to assist veterans and their families with psychiatric disorders and help them with the transitions to civilian life.

Kalpana Vadnagara is rooted in her middle class Indian culture. Although embracing her culture, she has overcome the obstacle she describes as "not placing adequate value on girls' education." She earned a bachelor's degree in mathematics in India and began teaching children. During this period, she discovered a great love for painting and the art form. Because of her social circumstances she was Unable to pursue her dream of becoming an artist. She soon married

#### 25 Years of Redlands Stem!



25 years ago, the Branch began its first STEM Conference at the University of Redlands, inviting 8<sup>th</sup> grade girls from the Redlands and Yucaipa School Districts for a day of exposure to STEM activities and STEM careers. Since that first conference, our branch has worked hard, encouraging girls to plan for their futures, take math and science courses in high school, and consider careers in STEM, while looking for ways to expand our reach to more and

more girls. 19 years ago, Branch members in the Pass Area wanted their girls to have the same STEM experience, but there was not enough space in the Redlands Conference to add girls from Banning and Beaumont. Our solution was to start a second conference at Mount San Jacinto College. When AAUW CA began hosting Tech Trek Summer Camps, we expanded our STEM activities to include scholarships for 7<sup>th</sup> grade girls to attend these amazing summer experiences.

Our branch has a lot to celebrate! Our Wednesday evening, October 3, dinner meeting has been turned into a celebration event for STEM. We will be inviting community partners, sponsors, past and current committee members, and anyone interested in AAUW's STEM activities to come to help celebrate. Our program will be a mixture of STEM remembrances and STEM hopes, dreams, and impacts. Please save the date and make a special effort to come to this particular branch event.

In order to kick off the entire celebration year correctly, the board has authorized the STEM Celebration Committee to sell premium tickets to this celebration event. Premium tickets will cost \$35 and will include the dinner and program, as well as a glass of wine, a commemorative gift, and other special touches. Members will be able to choose between a Premium ticket or to pay the regular dinner meeting fee of \$22. Non-member guests will be required to purchase a Premium ticket to the event prior to Sept 15<sup>th</sup>.

In order to pay for some of the extra celebration activities this year, we will be asking our STEM supporters to consider a special gift to AAUW Redlands Branch in honor of our 25<sup>th</sup> STEM Anniversary. Because we did not include the added expenses for the STEM Celebration in the budget that was passed in May, the board has approved a motion to increase the budget to cover the added costs. We anticipate that additional fundraising and donations to the branch will cover these added expenses; however, the branch also has adequate funds in reserve to handle the costs of these activities. As a member organization, the budget must be approved (and amended!) by a vote of the branch. This vote will take place at the September Branch meeting.
