- Create three-year staggered board terms at National level

- Eliminate college degree requirement for membership in AAUW...

This third proposed amendment generates the most discussion among our Branch members. One of AAUW's primary goals is to advance education for

women. Currently, membership in AAUW requires a college degree, an AA degree from a Junior College, or a professional degree, such as Registered Nurse, etc. Be sure to think about this measure and cast your vote accordingly.

It's important that our Branch members vote. AAUW has done a great job of making online voting extremely easy. Usually, all it takes is a few clicks on its website. On Sunday, April 29, 2018, over 200 women and girls gathered together at the Irvine Marriott for the 3rd Annual Tech Trek Reunion and to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of Tech Trek. Guest speakers educated attendees on the whereabouts of this "science camp for girls," and past Tech Trekkers reflected on the ways in which this experience contributed to their success in STEM fields.

These success stories inspired all of us, including Kenya Núñez who stated, "I believe that you must surround yourself with the people who you aspire to be like, and I aspire to be like the women of AAUW, fearless and persistent. Being surrounded by astonishing women and being able to interact with them and acknowledge not only who they are today, but also the journey leading up to their success has inspired me to pursue anything and everything that I am passionate about regardless of social norms or stereotypes. Today I am inspired, but tomorrow I will inspire."

Likewise, Miranda Christine Wardle reported, "The opportunity to return to an organization that impacted my life in such a big way was better than I ever could've expected and I am so proud and honored to be part of AAUW/Tech Trek along with such inspirational and empowering women and young ladies. It has been seven years since I got the call from the Redlands Branch notifying me that I was chosen to attend Tech Trek 2011, and the same excitement, curiosity, and pride I felt that day were also present when I found out that I had the opportunity to attend the AAUW reunion/luncheon. Seeing my fellow Tech-Trekkers' tremendous growth since attending camp, hearing about their achievements and experiences, and meeting ladies who share the same interests and aspirations as me was my favorite experience to take away from today's luncheon. Message of convention:

AAUW mission is the whole point

Serving the AAUW mission was the theme of the 2018 AAUW state convention.

Redlands Branch President Patty Ahearn and President Elect Toni Momberger attended the entire program April 27-29. Kathryn Brown and Kathy Toister attended the Speech Trek luncheon, and Sheron Bealer, Marie Mitchell and Barbara Simmons attended the Tech Trek luncheon. Ahearn and Momberger attended several plenaries and breakout sessions, and heard two keynote addresses. Here are the highlights.



Public Policy and Advocacy

- We must be political, but we must not be partisan. We endorse policy, not people. "Many feel that AAUW went a little left. Here's the thing. AAUW stayed exactly the same. Our values haven't changed. What has changed about us is society. What I love about us is we're consistent. And in Washington they know what we stand for, and that we'll back it up with research" -- Lisa Maatz
- Not every public policy fight is our public policy fight. We don't involve ourselves in gun control, but we can talk about gun violence prevention, which speaks to bullying and harassment.
- The key to winning when it comes to public policy is figure out what's in it for others. "Your sense of sisterhood is your best weapon" -- Lisa Maatz.
- Fair pay and job opportunities is the highest priority for AAUW California. These are followed by access to childcare, family friendly workplaces and eradication of poverty. These are the pillars of the women's economic agenda.

The equal pay laws in California are among the strongest. Alabama and Mississippi have none.

• Senate Bill 1284, the Hanna Beth Jackson Bill, a gender pay gap bill forcing employers to submit data on gender and race pay, was opposed by the California Chamber of Commerce.

The 50/50 film

- In 1970 there were three female heads of state worldwide. In the 1990s there were 15. Today there are 21, which is 8% of all the heads of state. Historically to date there have been about 50.
- As patriarchy escalated, there were some women who rose to power, "courageous women navigating uncharted terrain." The adversity was strong.
- "Wise, independent, rebellious women were labeled witches." 50,000 women were burned.
- In business, politics and culture, data show that having 50% women makes things better for everyone.

What makes a big difference is having a mentor.

"When you get to the top of the mountain, pull the next one up. When she's tired of taking in the view, let her pull the next woman up. And let her pull the next man up. Pull the next up. Up."

Here are some of the things branches were honored for at the awards dinner:

- Bringing in the League of Women Voters to do a survey by gender of participants in local commissions and boards of influence.
- Starting a summer branch breakfast retreat to plan the year's programs, specifically including new members. Choosing as a program "Gender Bias at Work, How to Address?"
- Having a Russian journalist as a speaker; having the plaintiffs and attorney from the Salk Institute case • as a program; having a presentation on suffrage over time; having a gender-studies professor speak
- Having an ongoing mission based program where women go to the county jail and do vocabulary ٠ lessons.
- Starting a science camp for 5th- and 6th-grade girls four Saturdays in a row on a university campus, • using the equipment the college kids use.
- Organizing a women's march through Public Policy, and consequently adding 80 members to the Public • Policy committee. Connecting with high-school girls. AND having one of the women featured in "Rape on the Night Shift" speak as a program.
- Celebrating women in math and science

Kimberly Churches, AAUW CEO, keynote speech

- The goal is to refocus and reenergize AAUW. •
- We have to get beyond aspirations, beyond words and really • get actual in what we're doing. The women's march had passion and chanting, but no plan for the next day. "We've got to get beyond platitudes and get to work."
- We give away almost \$4 million a year in scholarships and grants. We need to keep those recipients as part of the organization.
- We have been approaching membership models the same way for a long, long time. People say, "We keep putting our programs in the newspaper and they just don't come.' We take the thing that

worked on us and expect it to work on others. We should lead with question marks."We need to take young women and women of color out for coffee and ask questions -- what are they interested in, what excites them?

We need to replace the Golden Rule with the Platinum Rule -- treat others the way they want to be treated, not the way we want to be treated.

- "We do a bad job. We market badly. We aren't here to serve the cause of advancing membership. We ٠ advance equity for women and girls. That mission is why we're here."
- Think about pathways to jobs. •
- Grade agencies. Cities, school boards, police forces and others will pay attention when you publicly • give them a C- in women's equity. You change the culture.
- "We WILL achieve pay equity by 2030." •
- There are 340 million people in the United States and half of them are women. AAUW trained 17,000 through Work Smart and Start Smart last year. It's not enough. We will train 10 million women by 2022.

We are launching an online curriculum in English and Spanish.

The licensing fees are too high. It's set up as a revenue cow. It's supposed to be a mission cow.

- We need to bolster participation of women in leadership, including retirees. The average age of AAUW members is 72. We are missing out on a wealth of education and experience.
- Do more to engage women at college level and beyond. Do not call them "young people."

Women and Peacebuilding

• When women are involved in the peace process, peace lasts 15% longer.

Yet of all the peace agreements we see today, zero have women signatories. Of the people at the table, 2% are women.

Why is peacebuilding stronger in women? Women look for how everyone can win. Society allows women to be compassionate.
"Most men are raised by women, so there's definitely a disconnect," said a man in the audience.

"When we talk about why women need a seat at the table, we need to remember how we're engaging men," said a panelist.



President Patty Ahearn and President Elect Toni Momberger attended the gala dinner and heard keynote speaker Lisa Maatz talk about the imperative of political lobbying to serve the mission. Patty said you know you're in Orange County when the wine is \$11.50 a glass.



Redlands contestant wins Speech Trek at state level

Shining a light on the realities of sexism and offering her perspective on driving change won the AAUW Redlands Branch Speech Trek contestant the first-place title and \$1,500 in the final round April 28 during the state convention in Irvine.

Caroline Irving, a Redlands East Valley High School senior, had placed first out of five participants in the <u>Redlands Branch competition</u> Feb. 2 at Citrus Valley

High School. <u>The theme</u> from AAUW National was "How Can We Stand Up To Sexism?"

"My generation grew up knowing a woman can be anything," Caroline said to a packed Marriott banquet room. "But our culture is still marked by an unshakeable tie to sexism."

She shared her experience as an 8-year-old with suddenly short hair, being mistaken for a boy. Instead of small talk, an employee at the market complimented her for looking strong and asked her to help carry things. She thought, "Have I suddenly grown muscle mass now that my hair was shorter?"

And at the golf course, Caroline says she experienced gender privilege. Mistaken for a boy, she was invited to break rules and drive the cart.

"As a man, you are competent unless proven otherwise," she said. "As a woman, you are incompetent unless proven otherwise."

She said that the answer to gender bias is easy, and what AAUW can do is give people the opportunity to speak out, the tools to fight discrimination.

"It's our job going forward from this day out to carry that torch," she said.

Of the around 135 AAUW branches in California, 14 participated in Speech Trek. Five entrants were selected as winners and the top three competed at the convention.

The Sacramento branch has participated every year since the program began in 2007. This is the Redlands branch's second year. Ginny Evans-Perry was the coordinator, taking over for Patty Ahearn, who inaugurated the program at our branch.

Cash prizes are sponsored in memory of former Speech Trek coordinator Eleanor Allen, by her husband.



Highlights from the other two speeches

Chloe Johnson, Stockton Branch

- "Sexism is the root of so many evils our world."
- Can we be kind without being perceived as timid or exploitable?
- "The imposition of gender roles in our lives is detrimental to everyone"
- Men die by suicide 3.5 times more than women. The biggest demographic is middle-aged men.

Rohan Sharma, Roseville/S. Placer Branch

- People think sexism is no longer a problem because they haven't experienced it.
- "The most important thing we can all do is encourage women in our lives to be limitless."
- 54% of women have experienced sexual harassment; women make up 50.8% of the total population.
- "When someone says, 'She runs like a girl,' say, 'Yes, for congress, for the senate and for president.""

Reading and the Rainbow

<u>Ways to Disappear</u> is a novel of ideas and a novel of intrigue. The book is an innovative combination of mystery, noir, and humor.

Deep in gambling debt, Brazilian writer Beatriz Yagoda is last seen holding a suitcase and a cigar and climbing into an almond tree. Her American translator Emma travels to Brazil to solve the mystery, while fending off rapacious loan sharks and the washed-up editor who made Yagoda famous.

As Emma, Beatriz's daughter Raquel, and Beatriz's publisher and editor Roberto search for the vanished writer, it becomes clear they are each looking for their own version of the same woman, just as a translator sees her own version of a text.
