AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund Speaker

We are excited to have Aileen Rizo as the speaker at our March 2 branch meeting. Aileen bills herself as an Equal Pay Warrior and a STEAM Educator. She has a compelling story to tell regarding her personal fight to address the gender pay gap she encountered while teaching with the County of Fresno, California

Aileen is a math consultant for the Fresno County Office of Education.



Although when hired by Fresno County she had thirteen years of experience and a master's degree, she was placed at step one on the salary scale. During a lunch with colleagues, she was surprised and disheartened to learn a recent male coworker, with less education and experience, was hired with a starting salary much higher than hers. Aileen will tell us how her case traveled from the county of Fresno all the way to the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. Her story highlights an aspect of the gender pay gap not always identified--how starting at a lower salary perpetuates wage inequity throughout one's employment. Aileen was a recipient of funds from AAUW Legal Advocacy to aid in her court battles.

Legal Advocacy has been identified by AAUW National as a primary mission of our organization. We will be collecting funds for that purpose at the March meeting, so please be prepared to give generously. We can lobby and advocate extensively, but without "teeth" in our advocacy we are at a disadvantage. We need to be able to fight within our judicial system. Remember: No Money-No Mission. Last month we honored three members by donating money to the AAUW Fund in their name. What a joy it was to talk (and sing! Check out the video) about who they are, what they do, and why they deserve a moment in the spotlight.

We've reached out to almost 100 AAUW branches in states that have not yet ratified the Equal Rights Amendment (starting with Virginia and Georgia) to urge them to lobby their representatives and to offer what support we can. Many branch presidents have written us back, excited to be contacted by us and eager to keep a relationship with us alive.

I'm especially excited we are launching a new program to recognize workplaces that exemplify our mission in areas of equal pay, employment equity, and family- and women-friendly features.

Of course, I'm looking forward to what's still in store for the year.

This month we will put on our second STEM Conference of the year -- this one marking its 25th year. We have, by now, hosted about 25,000 girls through our branch, giving them hands-on experience with women role models in STEM-related fields.

And our next program speaker will be Aileen Rizo! What a get for our new Legal Advocacy Fund chairwoman and Named Gift Honoree Deb Seibly!

Next month we will not only sponsor Lunafest, but we are introducing a new event, a follow-up brunch the next morning to discuss the films, our reactions to them, and what they inspire us to do as a branch.

In late spring we will sponsor an attendee to the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders.

Then over the summer we will sponsor a record number of girls to Tech Trek.

What an amazing lot we pack into a year of changing girls' lives, knocking down barriers for women, and supporting one another.



PUBLIC POLICY

New Program

The Public Policy Program, at the direction of the board, has developed a program to recognize women/ family-friendly workplaces in our area. Nominations to the program can be made by businesses, employees, clients, or anyone who believes that a business is worthy of recognition. We hope that the program will encourage businesses in the area to adopt practices of salary and benefits equity, workplace environments free of harassment, opportunities for career development, and more. The program guideline describes how the program will operate and includes criteria for evaluating businesses.

ERA Ratification

Did you know that it is still possible to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment? We are one state short of ratification. We wondered if there was any way to help other states pass the ERA, given that California has already ratified it. We decided to contact the AAUW chapters in states that haven't ratified and to find out if we could help in any way. The first state we contacted was Virginia. Virginia's state senate had just passed the ERA. Virginia AAUW chapters lobbied hard to gain the votes in the House of Delegates but were unsuccessful. Our chapter President will be sending letters to Georgia and Arizona offering our help. We will keep you posted on their responses.

Getting to Know Your Membership VP

Jim was an ER Doc at Redlands Community Hospital for 30 years, and I joined a group practice with offices in Redlands and Claremont. We both retired last March and are planning to spend summers in Portland (where our sons have settled) and winters (when it starts raining in Oregon) back in southern California.
