### Award Spotlight: Congratulations to Kim Cousins



Kim Cousins, a professor and chair of the Cal State San Bernardino Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry, has been named the recipient of the 2019-20 Outstanding Professor award, the university's top faculty honor.

Every year, the announcement is made during a surprise visit to the winner's classroom or lab by CSUSB President Tomás D. Morales. This year the announcement was still a surprise, but it was done virtually. Led by Morales and Provost Shari McMahan, about 75 of the university community, including members of the cabinet, previous award winners, faculty and staff waited for Cousins to be allowed into the virtual

meeting, then cheered their congratulations to a surprised Cousins.

"Provost McMahan and I join the university awards committee in saying that Kimberly is a prime example, a stellar educator, researcher and leader in the CSUSB community who embodies the qualities that help all of us to excel and be better at our calling as scholars, educators and leaders," Morales said. "Her generosity, dedication, versatility epitomize the excellence and range toward which our entire faculty strive."

"You have excelled in every area of this award – teaching, research, scholarly activities and service and a particular note is the amount of the grants you have secured, which is rarely done at a comprehensive university," McMahan said. "But what I find most impressive is what you have done with them to transform the lives of our students and to advance our community in your discipline, all while serving as the chair of the department of chemistry and biochemistry."

A beaming Cousins gave her thanks for the award and the opportunity to work with students and faculty. "I really love teaching at Cal State San Bernardino. It's those students that really make a difference, make it worthwhile, and the great fellow faculty really make a huge difference," Cousins said. "I know there's a lot of talented faculty on campus and to get this award I am truly humbled."

CHAT currently serves about 30 women by matching a conversational-English learner ("chattee") with an AAUW volunteer ("chattor".)

All chattees meet the AAUW's educational requirements and several have joined our chapter. The chattees come from all over the world: Russia, China, Korea, Mexico, Venezuela, Peru and more. The CHAT volunteer is matched with a chattee and they set up a time to talk at their mutual convenience. Monthly group CHAT meetings are held over Zoom, so that everyone gets a chance to meet each other. Trudy Waldron and Katherine Gifford, the CHAT coordinators, are available to help you get started.

Five wonderful chattees are currently waiting for a conversational partner. The pandemic may have reduced our ability to travel, but through CHAT we have the opportunity to get to know women from around the world. ### **Nancy Yowell Memorial**





What is AmazonSmile?

Did you know that Amazon will automatically donate .5% of your purchases to your favorite charity? The Amazon Smile program allows all Amazon purchasers, both regular and Prime, to designate a charity for their donation. AAUW Redlands is one of the charities you can support.

- 1. You can shop on either the Amazon or Amazon Smile website BUT you must purchase your items at the Amazon smile website. Regular Amazon or the mobile apps for Android or Iphone do not connect with the Smile donations. The Smile website is maintained by Amazon and your regular login works. The address is: <a href="https://smile.amazon.com/">https://smile.amazon.com/</a>
- 2. Sign in using your regular Amazon username and password. Notice that your cart, shipping addresses, payment information are all identical to your regular Amazon account. You should notice that the Amazon logo in the corner says Amazon Smile.
- 3. Choose your charity. The first time you login, Amazon Smile will prompt you to select a charity. Of course, Redlands AAUW is a great one to choose! If you have previously chosen a charity and would like to change, hover over **supporting** and notice that there is a link to change the charity. This page is cool because it also shows how much your purchases have generated for the selected charity.
- 4. Search for items, place in cart and check out as usual. Your donation will be automatically calculated and applied.

A few suggestions: If you purchase on the regular amazon website, the IPhone app or the Android app, NO donation is made on your behalf. I find the Smile website hard to view on my phone. To get around this, use the Amazon app to search and select items. After you have put items in your cart, just go to the Amazon smile page to check out. All of your cart item will be there!

You can put a shortcut to the Amazon smile site on your desktop to make it easier to get to the site. On an IPhone, visit the <u>smile.amazon.com</u>. Hit share. Now click add to home screen. You will get a link to Smile on your home screen. For Android, go to the <u>smile.amazon.com</u> site. Click the three dots on the upper right by the address. Scroll down to Add to Home screen. This will put a link on your home screen.
