I know everyone is so glad this election year is about to come to a close. However, I want to take a few minutes to discuss the importance of voting, not just in this election year but whenever we have an election. In our system of government, we are privileged to have our individual rights protected by our Constitution. We have a tendency to stress our rights as citizens, but with those rights are also responsibilities. The most important of these responsibilities, as a good citizen, is to vote. A republican form of government depends upon an <u>educated</u> populace participating in the election process.

For women, especially, who did not even receive the right to vote nationwide until 1920, voting should not be seen as just a right but a responsibility. We need to pay our respects to those women who fought so long and hard to get us that right to vote by using it whenever we have an opportunity. Many people say, "I have no interest in politics." But that's not true. Everyone has an interest in politics because politics is how we decide who will represent our views in our political system. November Branch Meeting: "#FreeBlackMamas"

The second wave of Feminism brought significant gains for white and middle-class women, but black, brown, poor, and queer women were mostly ignored. Stahly-Butts will discuss the way in which the ideas of Black Queer Feminism and the prison abolition movement animate the politics of the Movement for Black Lives using #FreeBlackMomas as a case study in how the criminal/legal system targets black and queer women and the work of the National Bail Out Collective to address these injustices.

Marbre Stahly-Butts, Executive Director of Law for Black Lives, works closely with organizers, lawyers, and legal advocates to build a responsive legal infrastructure for movement organizations and to advance and actualize radical policy. Marbre is a

founding member of the National Bail Out Collective, the organization behind the Free Black Mama's Movement. She also was a founding member of the Movement For Black Lives Policy Table and helped develop the Vision for Black Lives Policy Platform. Since graduating from Yale Law School, Marbre has supported local and national organizations from across the country in their policy development and advocacy. She joined the Center for Popular Democracy as a Soros Justice Fellow in Fall 2013. Her Soros Justice work focused on organizing and working with families affected by aggressive policing and criminal justice policies in New York City in order to develop meaningful bottom up policy reforms. While in law school, Marbre focused on the intersection of criminal justice and civil rights and gained legal experience with the Bronx Defenders, the Equal Justice Initiative, and the Prison Policy Initiative. Before law school Marbre received her Masters in African Studies from Oxford University and worked in Zimbabwe, organizing communities impacted by violence, and then in South Africa, teaching at Nelson Mandela's alma mater. Marbre graduated from Columbia University, with a BA in African-American History and Human Rights. Marbre is the daughter of Geraldine Stahly, Ph.D., who is a vital member of this AAUW chapter.

I have for a number of years served as a poll worker in our elections. As a poll worker you are required to attend a two-hour training workshop before each election. A number of changes were introduced this year because of the pandemic. Every person was sent a mail-in ballot. You can use that ballot to vote or choose to do so in person. Polling places will be open for four days this time, October 31-November 2 from 10:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. and November 3 from 7:00 a.m.-8:00 p.m. Masks are required. I highly recommend if you vote in person, take your mail-in ballot with you to surrender. If you choose to use your mail in ballot, my recommendation is to drop it in one of the official drop boxes or take it to the polling place on the four election days. No matter how you choose to vote, **VOTE!**

STEM Initiatives Update



The STEM Committee met in September and October to undertake the process of planning our 2021 STEM conferences. Because we have been informed by Mt. San Jacinto College that our January 2021 conference cannot be held on campus (in-person classes are not possible), we are researching the feasibility of offering a virtual platform, distance-learning conference for the Banning and Beaumont middle schools. The

University of Redlands has not yet made a final decision regarding the fate of our March 10, 2021, scheduled in-person conference on its campus; RUSD has indicated that if on campus, in-person learning is back in place for its 8th graders by March 2021, they will participate. We will be contacting YCUSD to learn whether they are in agreement with RUSD. For the present, the committee is proceeding with plans to prepare a virtual conference for use by all four school districts. *The next STEM Initiatives meeting will be held via Zoom on Saturday morning, November 14, at 9 AM. AAUW National recently announced that for the 2021 Tech Trek season, camps in all states must be delivered on a virtual platform. Since the cancellation of the 2020 season, California Tech Trek has been working on alternative solutions, which includes a fully tested virtual platform option designed and implemented by our UC San Diego camp director. The commencement of the student selection process for the 2021 season is set for January. 

Get to Know our AAUW Redlands Communications Vice President

Hi Ladies of AAUW! My name is Priya Vedula, and I am honored to be your Vice President of Communications! Twenty-seven years ago, I was born 8,000 miles away from Redlands, in New Delhi, India. My first language was Hindi, and my first word was "nani", which means grandma. When I was just a few months old, my dad got the opportunity of a lifetime to pursue an internship in the state of New York. As the story goes, my parents left their home and their family behind with just a few hundred dollars in their pocket, in pursuit of the American Dream for their little baby girl. They were greeted by Lady Liberty as they entered the US. Little did they know that the journey to stability in America was going to be tumultuous. If you're ever in the mood for stories about our adventurous (and sometimes harrowing) 5-10 years in the Bronx and Queens, *come chat with me*!

The events of 9/11 triggered our move away from the Melting Pot to the Land of Lakes--Michigan. My parents moved to serve the rural



populations, and my sister and I went from listening to Britney Spears to listening to Leanne Womack and Reba. Life in the farmlands was beautiful and humbling but challenging in its own ways. Just before my senior year, I met a boy from Minnesota at summer school in Harvard. I was only 16, but I knew after just two weeks that he was the one I would spend the rest of my life with. To hear the struggles of an Indian-American relationship and how my family reacted to that situation, *come chat with me* G.

After high school, we graduated together from the University of Michigan in three years. I received my B.S. in Biology, and he received his B.A. in Political Sciences. Post-college, I had a little stint on American Idol, as one of a very small handful of Indian Americans to ever reach the top 80. I waited in line for 12 hours on a


cold, dreary day outside of a football stadium for the opportunity and went through four rounds before finally meeting Ryan and the crew. Yes, JLO is as beautiful and fierce in person as she looks on the screen. Yes, both Harry Connick Jr. and Ryan are as dreamy and wonderful in real life. *Come chat with me about it*.

Afterwards, we moved to Minnesota where my fiancé began law school, and I pursued full-time research as a microbiologist at U-Minnesota. During my time as a researcher, I was working on medications to prolong the lives of HIV/AIDS patients in Sub-Saharan Africa. My primary concern was not whether the medication was going to work but how a mother in a village would travel to her local clinic to receive it. Would she be able to afford it? Would she be able to keep up with the medication schedule and have enough nutrition to ensure she wasn't taking it on an empty stomach? These questions got me thinking about the barriers to healthcare and how to remove them. So, I pursued my Master of Public Health at Columbia University where I received my degree in Health Policy and Management with a specialization in Policy Analysis. My degree led me to Loma Linda University Health where I worked as a full-time Health Policy Analyst, research and educating about the various health issues in San Bernardino County and tangible policy solutions that would help expand access to oral health, mental health, and nutrition. I was so enamored by the power of policy that in 2018, I ran for City Council in Redlands. In 2018, I had the privilege to vote for the very first time, and that vote was for myself! The process was enlightening and empowering, so much so that I began finding more ways to get involved in the community as an advocate! In 2019, with the help of amazing community leaders like Mario Saucedo and Eddie Tejeda, I wrote Resolution 8022 "Healthy Redlands," which passed unanimously!

In the last two years, I have had the utmost honor and pleasure of connecting with so many of you as we serve our community in an effort for a more just and equitable society. I went into science for two reasons: 1) I found the human body fascinating, and 2) I wanted to be a woman in STEAM. AAUW encouraged and nurtured me in so many ways and gave me the confidence to achieve my dreams to pursue medicine as well as to encourage other women to take their seats at the halls of power by running for office or pursuing that science degree or work promotion! I am so excited to say that I am now a first-year medical school student here in San Bernardino County, and I was recently elected to serve as the delegate for the American Medical Association. I am looking forward to my role as VP of Communications, especially in this pandemic when finding ways to connect and communicate is imperative. I cherish teamwork and new ideas, so if you ever have any suggestions, advice, or comments for me, please bring them my way! I look forward to working with you all--you are my AAUW family!

Unfair pay, pregnancy discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and violations of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 can affect both women and men.

AAUW's Legal Advocacy

Fund addresses these barriers by informing people of their rights and using the legal system to seek justice and change. LAF was created in 1981 by AAUW members and has provided millions of dollars to balance the scales of justice for people working toward gender equity through the legal system.

We support brave plaintiffs seeking legal redress for equal pay, Title IX, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and tenure denial violations. We allocate \$100,000 annually to help fund landmark cases, such as *Wal-Mart v. Dukes* and *Cioca v. Rumsfeld*, as well was cases with the potential to set future precedents like *Rizo v. Fresno County Office of Education*.
