Commander Rachel Tolber,
Redlands Police Department
"Women in Law Enforcement
and Evidence-Based Policing"



Rachel Tolber began her law enforcement career in 1998 in Redlands, California, where she is currently a Commander overseeing the Patrol and Community Services Bureau. She has served the department in a variety of positions, including Field Training Officer, Patrol Officer and Supervisor, Detective, Range Master, Investigations Supervisor, Crisis

Negotiator, Training Manager and Professional Standards.

Rachel's law enforcement background includes extensive collaboration and work with numerous local, state, and international law enforcement agencies. In addition, she worked with the department's criminologist on various research projects and grants. Her research interests include re-entry, restorative justice, and technology.

Rachel has been a board member of the Home Again Project, Gang Reduction Intervention Team, and presently serves on the board of the San Bernardino Sexual Assault Services. Based on her interest and commitment to evidence-based policing, Rachel joined several other colleagues in founding the American Society of Evidence-Based Policing (ASEBP). The ASEBP mission is to advance policing by incorporating the best available evidence-based practices to ensure the least harmful, most effective, fairest, and safest strategies are employed to prevent crime, reduce harm, and improve community wellness.

Rachel is also a presenter at our STEM Conferences.

The AAUW CA Board feels very strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization. Voting will take place from April 7, 2021, to May 17, 2021.

Those who have an email address on file with AAUW will receive instructions electronically; others will receive notification of the vote by mail.

Every Voice Matters

This spring, AAUW members will vote on a long-standing membership requirement, which creates a barrier to women who do not hold a college degree. By eliminating this requirement, AAUW can become a more diverse and inclusive organization, better aligned with the needs of

women today.

Why is the Board asking to eliminate the membership requirement?

- 1. It is the right thing to do, and it is in keeping with our mission to advance gender equity.
- 2. Eliminating the degree requirement will bring AAUW membership criteria in line with its mission to advance gender equity.
- 3. Greater diversity can only strengthen AAUW and our ability to advance equity.
- 4. Times have changed, and society has changed. AAUW strives to meet our mission and society's needs today.
- 5. AAUW empowers women. How does keeping the membership requirement help you empower women?
- 6. Just like our founding mothers, we can be role models for positive change in the world. But we cannot have the impact we seek when our membership criteria don't match our mission and values.
- 7. AAUW is unique due to our breadth of programming, research, policy and advocacy, fellowships and grants, and most importantly, a grassroots membership that can be mobilized to fight for what we believe in. We should open this powerful grassroots network up to all who want to join the fight.
- 8. Education comes in many forms. Those who do not have degrees can still be strong advocates for our mission.

AAUW STEM REDLANDS BRANCH

2021 STEM Conferences

March 2021 saw over 6 months of innovative planning and hard work culminate in our 27th annual STEM Conference for 8th Grade Girls. The challenge of having our area public middle schools limited to distance learning was met in two ways: first, by partnering with RUSD to provide the girls with virtual classroom access to our STEM-career women speakers' workshops on two consecutive conference Fridays; second, for the schools in our

remaining local districts, by recruiting and assisting our STEM-positive speaker volunteers to create short YouTube videos describing a wide variety of STEM careers and highlighting the fun and importance of pursuing STEM classes and activities during students' high school years. Approximately 375 RUSD girls, plus dozens of adult chaperones, attended the live virtual classroom conferences—40 more than from the same middle schools than had participated in our last live, on-campus conference held at the University of Redlands in February 2020.



"Welcome" segment for the March 5th RUSD conference


The YouTube videos, published live on our 2021 AAUW STEM Conference channel in early March, have garnered interest among area middle school districts, who have begun this month to use them in science classes and career-day programming for both boys and girls. 
