Sue's News

You'll also vote on four candidates to join AAUW's 15-person board of directors.*

<u>AAUW-CA</u> Voting period is <u>April 16 to May 7</u>. You should have received a "2021 AAUW California Election Ballot" email from *siteadmin@aauw-ca.org via SurveyMonkey* with a direct link to VOTE on Public Policy Priorities, AAUW CA Bylaws, and Board of Director positions.

The Academic Case Carrier (ACC) Program of Redlands Unified School

District offers dedicated support to foster, homeless, and other "at-promise" youth. These students face overwhelming challenges including socio-economic disadvantages and the effects of displacement from family and schools. The ACCs concentrate on improving students' educational performance and personal achievement and assist students in making choices that lead to stronger school-connectedness and academic performance.

Peter Lock, Coordinator of the ACC Program, and Ruth Sotomayor, Academic Case Carrier, will show how the program strives to build strong and empowering relationships with students and families. It also offers teachers, administrators, and parents information they can use to support the students' academic and emotional



success.

Peter Lock currently serves as the coordinator for the Academic Case Carrier Program and has been in this role since January 2016. Peter graduated from the University of La Verne (1980) and earned his Master's degree (2004), and Doctorate (2010) from the University of Redlands. He has been in education for 37 years; since coming to Redlands Unified 23 years ago, he has




2021 Tech Trek will be Virtual

Virtual Tech Trek is designed to provide campers with exposure to computer science and engineering, along with workshops designed to explore individual STEM specialties more deeply using a hands-on or interactive approach. Hands-on activities, inspirational speakers, and interactive workshops help to make STEM subjects fun as well as

educational. Trained instructors and coaching staff including near-peer Tech Trek alumnae, work alongside credentialed teachers and women in STEM-related careers.

This is a week-long virtual camp for rising 8th grade girls. The camp is centered on a morning project-based robotics/engineering/coding class that meets daily and results in a personalized creation by week's end. After lunch, the campers hear from inspirational women for an hour, then participate in one or more 90-minute hands-on or interactive science, technology, engineering, and math workshops to encourage fun while learning. They can return for evening workshops with girls from another country, social activities, or even parent sessions.

2021 AAUW California Lobby Day

On March 24, 2021, the AAUW California Public Policy Committee, in conjunction with our Advocacy firm MVM Strategy Group, conducted a hugely successful "virtual" Lobby Day, with 111 AAUW California members, representing 63 different branches, participating.

Way back in my high school history class, I learned about the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire, which occurred in Greenwich Village one Saturday in 1911. Factories like the Triangle Shirtwaist dotted the New York City landscape employing mostly immigrant women. During their 6-day, 52-hour workweek, they earned only between \$7 and \$12, the equivalent of \$191 to \$327 in today's dollars. Their working conditions were cramped and hazardous. The scrap-strewn workplace was filthy and flammable. The doors had been locked to prevent the women from taking unauthorized breaks. And when the fire broke out, the owners of the factory fled to the roof, letting the fire claim 146 workers, 123 of them women and girls. The tragedy shined a light on these dangerous conditions and led the New York legislature to pass 38 new laws including one sponsored by Frances Perkins, who would become our first woman cabinet member.

Until Lobby Day, I thought that our labor regulations and minimum wage laws had done away with these sweatshop conditions. But how wrong I was.

Senate Bill 62, the Garment Workers Protection Act, was authored by Maria Elena Durazo, the senator from Central and East Los Angeles. Piecemeal work is still the norm in the underground garment economy. In Los Angeles, some 46,000 garment workers — mostly immigrants from central and south America — work 10-12 hours a day earning on average \$5.15 an hour. This rate is unchanged since 1911, where the workers in the Triangle Shirtwaist factory earned the equivalent of \$3.67 to \$6.29 per hour.

SB 62 would eliminate the piece rate and ensure that workers receive a minimum wage by strengthening enforcement of wage theft laws meant to protect garment workers. It would ensure that retailers cannot use complicated layers of contracts to avoid responsibility for illegal and abusive practices. And it would ensure that workers are paid for all time spent working.



A team of AAUW members, including Kris Goodfellow, Erica Rosenfeld, Sharen Wegner, Katherine Gifford, and Kathryn Brown, met virtually on March 24 with state legislative staff from the offices of assembly members Holden and Rodriguez and Senator Leyva urging them to support SB 62 and two other important pieces of legislation: AB 92 and SB 373.

The second bill we discussed was written by our own Eloise Gomez Reyes. The Assembly member from San Bernardino and Assembly Majority Leader opened the

day addressing the entire group of AAUW members at our morning kick-off event. She thanked AAUW for fighting for equity for women and girls. She talked about how the pandemic had disproportionately affected women who most often have borne the burden of childcare while trying to work during the pandemic.


Her Assembly Bill 92, Child Care Family Fees, would use federal funds to create an equitable sliding scale for family fees. It would help struggling families to pay for childcare through October 31, 2022. The pandemic also caused many childcare providers to go out of business, further limiting affordable childcare options. This bill would benefit the economic recovery of the state by helping parents remain in the workforce and achieve economic stability. AAUW is a co-sponsor of this bill.

The last bill that we discussed was written by Senator Dave Min, from Orange County. Senate Bill 373, the Protecting Vulnerable Populations from Coerced Debt Bill, would prevent the survivors of domestic violence, elder abuse, or foster youth from being responsible for coerced or fraudulent debt. Financial abuse occurs in 99 percent of domestic violence cases. It includes stealing money, credit, property, or identity and forcing a vulnerable party into filing fraudulent legal financial documents. Access to economic resources is the most likely predictor of whether a survivor will be able to permanently separate from their abuser.

SB 373 would make it easy for victims of financial abuse to prove this was done under duress or without their knowledge. It will also prohibit creditors from collecting when the debt is deemed to be coerced. And it will prohibit consumer credit reporting agencies from including coerced debts in their credit score calculations and reports.

We hope that you will join us in supporting these bills. Neither of our representatives were able to meet with the team of AAUW lobbyists. So if you wish to write to your Assembly member and/or Senator, we encourage you to do so. The district director for Asm.
