Heart Forward Leadership, an organization focused on bringing out the best in education professionals. Her experiences as an educator, second language learner, and child who experienced poverty inspire her passion to

intentionally embed people-first practices into the work we do. Pam has presented and led workshops on 21st Century learning, special education, systems change, the use of technology to enhance and accelerate student learning, as well as wellness, mindful movement. In addition to having her work recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and Future Ready, Pam served as part of the transition advisory team for California Superintendent of Public Instruction, Tony Thurmond, and has presented at many conferences throughout the state and country. She is currently working with the King City Union Elementary School District and pursuing her doctorate in Organizational Leadership at the University of Massachusetts Global.

Dr. Maria Martinez-Poulin serves as the Deputy Superintendent of the Los Angeles County Office of Education. She has 31 years of experience in public education as a champion of equity and access. Martinez-Poulin most recently served as Superintendent of the Whittier City School District. Previously, she held key positions in Orange County as an Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, elementary school principal, and high school assistant principal. She also has taught high school English and elementary school in LA County. Martinez-Poulin earned her doctorate degree from the University of Southern California, where she conducted research in mentoring and leadership. She has been recognized for her service and dedication with the 57th Assembly District, 2021 Distinguished Women of the Year Award: Honoring Resilience and Excellence, and for her work during the pandemic to support students and staff.

Dr. Rosa Isiah currently serves as Director of Elementary, Equity, and Access in NLMUSD. Dr. Isiah is passionate about equity and social justice, multilingual education, leadership, and closing opportunity gaps for historically underserved students. Dr. Isiah's experiences as an immigrant, an English learner, and a child in poverty add to her passion for her work. Dr. Isiah is the founder of #WeLeadEd Twitter chat and the WeleadED BAMradio radio podcast focused on Ed Leadership and Social Justice. Dr. Isiah co-authored five books on the whole child, equity, leadership, and the power of relationships, including *Beyond Conversations About Race* (2021). Dr. Isiah contributes her voice to blogs, podcasts, articles, and books on social justice, diversity, equity, access, and women in leadership. Dr. Isiah was the recipient of the Loyola Marymount University 2019 Leader for Social Justice Award. Dr. Isiah is a Solution Tree Culture and Equity, English Learner, and Parent Engagement professional development associate. She has also presented on social justice topics at conferences including AMLE Guatemala City and Hawaii, UCLACenterX Math Parent Project, San Diego County Office of Ed, NY SPED Collaborative, ASCD, ACSA Region 14, CA League of Schools, ISTE, EdSurge, Future Ready, and CALSA. Dr. Isiah serves as an Advisory Board member for the Center for Antiracist Education (CARE) and for the Alliance for Excellent Education Future Ready Schools.

Veronica Godinez is currently a Principal at Lincoln Elementary School with the Pomona Unified School District. She has had 16 years of teaching and administrative experience. She has served as an elementary, middle school, and high school teacher in Southern California and/or Southeast Idaho and an elementary and middle school principal experience as well in both states. She also has experience teaching at the university level. She taught for the University of Redlands, preparing student teachers in multiple and single subject programs. She has served on several boards but most recently completed a term with CUE, a national non-profit organization serving educators across the state of California. And she served on several committees with the organization: Executive Board, Administrators, Lead Learners, and the Equity & Access Learning Networks. 
There will be two discussion groups, one on Monday afternoons at 1:00 p.m. at Sue Wallace's home and one on Wednesday
