The notion of a "Girl Gang" is particularly relevant. At our February 5<sup>th</sup> branch meeting, I was very excited to hear the "#SisterCircle" women talk about how they built and continue to sustain a community and connection with other women. This is a model we may be able to use in our own attempts to tighten our connections with one another and to make Redlands AAUW an even more extraordinary Branch.

In this regard, the Public Policy Interest group is working on an application to identify the Redlands Branch as a "5-star Branch." We have always been one of California's extremely active branches but have never been recognized as such. What we discovered is that we are not recognized because we have never applied. What we also discovered in looking over the criteria for being considered a 5-star branch is that we have already fulfilled many of the criteria. Our current focus on Diversity is an important step in reaching the benchmark for being considered a 5-star branch. **Mary Jane Auerbacher**, a 46-year member of AAUW and president in 1996, died Saturday, Jan. 22, 2022, at the age of 99. She was an AAUW Named Gift Honoree in 1984.

She was organist for her church up until about ten weeks before she died.

She was an only child, born in Los Angeles. A graduate of Los Angeles High School, she majored in English and history for two years at the University of Redlands, graduating in 1945 with a degree in biology and a teaching credential.

She taught herself to play piano before beginning organ lessons when she was a sophomore at the UR. She became the first graduate who was not a music major to play in the university's Commencement Recital. (*continued*)

Following graduation, she worked as a teacher in the Coachella Valley in a migratory camp, with 44 children in her first-grade class.

Mary Jane met her husband Fred the first day she began as organist at the Highland Congregational Church. They married in 1946 and had three daughters.

The family traveled to Europe frequently and lived in Vienna in 1957-1958, so the children could attend public school and learn the German language, also taking advantage of concerts and museums.

A second time the family lived in Neuchatel, a French canton of Switzerland.

She was one of the founders of Valley Preparatory School where she taught music for more than 20 years. For 30 years she prepared a monthly cultural history for the students, including in-depth research and field trips into major museums in Los Angeles.

She originated the Alternate Christmas Fair at First Baptist Church and taught Sunday School there for 30 years, also serving as Sunday School Superintendent. She was a circle leader for the American Baptist Women and president for that group and the Inland Association of American Baptist Churches, both twice.

Among the churches she served with music have been the Cucamonga Lutheran Church, Garden Presbyterian, Rialto Presbyterian Church, Colton Methodist Church, and Yucaipa Presbyterian Church. She directed the junior and senior choirs at the Highland Avenue Lutheran Church in San Bernardino and bought them an organ and bells for their hand bell choir.

She was a member of Spinet (the 125-year-old music organization in Redlands) since 1945, serving as president 1975-77. In the early days, she and a Spinet friend worried that young children weren't coming to UR concerts and went to see Wilbur "Pop" Showalter as music teacher at the high school about busing children from the schools to the concerts. He agreed to make those arrangements, and so began concerts for children by the orchestra.

Mary Jane was a past dean of the American Guild of Organists and president of P.E.O. Chapter VP. She received the UR Town and Gown "Woman's Place is Every Place" Award in 1994 in the category of philanthropic service. She was a board member of the Redlands Chamber Music Society, which organized Sunday afternoon concerts in the Prospect Park Carriage House.

She served as a docent for the San Bernardino County Museum, interpreting exhibits to school children.



Mary Jane celebrated her 97<sup>th</sup> birthday at the September 2019 Redlands Branch meeting.

She served from 1977-2001 on the board of the Redlands Community Music Association (Bowl), and in 2002, she was declared an honorary lifetime member of the board. While serving, she provided dinner for the board meetings and cooked, baked, and served a feast for the RCMA's annual Major Donor Reception. She received the Bowl's "Hero of the Arts" award at their annual dinner in 2013.

AAUW Redlands Branch was celebrating its 50th year the year she served as president. She organized and directed AAUW's Redlands Recorder Group for some 45 years and later led the Great Discussions group for many years.

She was a member of the Cosmos Club, a group of women who write papers on a variety of subjects. At one of the meetings, she wrote on Renaissance dances, and the Recorder Group then played dances for the members.

In August 2012, her Richard Neutra-designed home was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. The nomination papers noted "The Auerbacher home is particularly compelling because the original owner, Mary Jane Auerbacher, still resides in the house." She shared her home for the 2011 YMCA Holiday Home Tour.

Circa 1995 Mary Jane was one of 218 men and women community leaders invited to autograph the quilt titled "Those Who Made a Difference in Redlands." Under their name, all signers were asked to write a word or two listing how they would want to be remembered in a hundred years. Of all her activities and accomplishments, Mary Jane wrote "A.A.U.W. President."

On Saturday, January 29<sup>th</sup>, several of us had the chance to Zoom-in to hear an exciting presentation at the Southeast Interbranch Council meeting. Our own Patty Ahearn, who chairs the Council, tipped us off about this opportunity to ramp up our Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion ("DEI") initiatives by hearing from AAUW's California DEI Committee. The speakers, Janice Lee and Elaine Johnson, stressed the importance of each AAUW branch becoming more aware of and committed to understanding, valuing, and accepting diversity (which they defined as all aspects of human differences), and to promoting equal treatment, so that all of our members, potential members, and allies feel respected and included.

Some branches are new to DEI initiatives, while others, like ours, have promoted interest groups to learn more about racial justice issues. Our Redlands Racial Justice Interest Group, has been meeting, studying, and discussing for over a year, and we have learned a tremendous amount and discussed deep feelings. Although we plan to continue learning, we also embrace the need to engage more with actions, both to challenge racial injustice and institutions in society and also to achieve more awareness, diversity, and inclusion in our own branch and communities.

We were pleased to learn from the speakers Lee and Johnson that the statewide AAUW has also made this a priority and is actively reaching out to councils and branches to promote DEI initiatives and offer resources and advice. Lee and Johnson encourage the branches to do several things. First, we should identify the most relevant DEI challenges in our branch. Next, we should develop a committee to initiate actions and appoint a DEI Coordinator. From there we can turn to the rich set of resources the national AAUW organization has put together. Any of us can have a look at this wonderful Toolkit, at AAUW.org/resources/member/governance-tools/deitoolkit/. It has basic education about the issues, a video, ideas for getting started on more organized work on diversity, and a library of suggested readings for those who want to learn more.

Here in Redlands, the Policy Committee, under Cassie MacDuff's leadership, has initiated pursuit of the 5-Star recognition for our branch, which has led to the idea of appointing a volunteer to shepherd DEI initiatives, and I have agreed to take that on for an initial period. Looking forward to more discussions and goals! If you are interested in helping, I invite you to join us at the next meeting of the Racial Justice group, on Thursday, March 10, at 6:30 p.m.
