May Branch Meeting "Museum of Redlands - From Beginning to Present"



Steve Stockton is president of the Muscum of Redences Redlands Historical Museum Association and leader for the current construction of the Museum of Redlands at the corner of Brookside and Center streets.

He will briefly trace the 22-year path of founding the museum, searching for a site, working with the architect and A.K. Smiley Public Library Heritage Room on the design, and speak about future plans and what this museum will mean to Redlands.

The MOR (Museum of Redlands) main structure with galleries and second-floor storage space as well as the adjacent Pavilion, garden area and Solter Stage, are meant to provide a "Living Room" for Redlands--a space not only to display the history of Redlands and the Inland Area but offer a variety of meeting space needed in Our Town.

Steve is nearly a native of Redlands and attended Redlands schools. He received his bachelor's degree in Management from the University of Redlands and is a registered civil engineer with 41 years' experience with three water districts.

He retired in 2005 from the San Gorgonio Pass Water Agency, which brought imported water from Northern California to Beaumont and Banning.

He is a past president of Kiwanis Club of Redlands, is a YMCA Board member, is a member of the City of Redlands Utilities and Public Works Commission, and has served on the RHMA/Museum Board since 2006.

And my daughter-in-law came to the U.S. from Ukraine in 1988, after her father, who was a "Refusenik," spent some time in a Russian prison. I can only hope that by the time you read this newsletter, the War in Ukraine will be over, and we will be helping them rebuild.


Condolences



What's New with the Redlands Adult Literacy Program

Are you looking for a rewarding, flexible volunteer opportunity? Please consider the Redlands Adult Literacy Program. It is a dynamic program that is always looking for ways to better meet the needs of adult learners. One such way is forging new partnerships with organizations in the community.

The new partnership between the Redlands Adult Literacy Program and YMCA of the East Valley is an example. The YMCA offers meeting space for adult learner teams and programs that have grown out of Adult Literacy, including Family Literacy and the Conversation Corner, a program that helps adults practice their conversational English.

The Family Literacy Program was designed to support adult learners who are currently enrolled or plan to enroll in adult literacy. Participants have family-oriented goals, such as reading a book to their children or helping their children with schoolwork. **Studies show parental literacy is directly linked to the success of children in school.**

Conversation Corner helps adults who are trying to learn conversational English so that they have the conversational skills required for enrolling into the Redlands Adult Literacy Program. Participants practice useful skills, such as ways to introduce themselves to people they encounter in their daily lives along with casual conversation about their favorite recipes. The informal setting is a comfortable way for participants to practice speaking English.

If you know of someone who needs help in reading, writing, or English conversation, please encourage them to take the first step in changing their lives by contacting the Redlands Adult Literacy Program. All services are free and confidential.

The Redlands Adult Literacy Program seeks additional volunteers who can help motivated adults improve their reading and writing.
