January Branch Meeting University of Redlands President Krista Newkirk



Krista L. Newkirk is the 12th president of the University of Redlands.

During her first year, she oversaw the launch of the University's School of Business & Society, a first-of-its-kind school that prepares students with critical business concepts and skills to be effective in the new era of business within a societal context.

To advance affordability and accessibility at the University, Newkirk implemented the Redlands Promise campaign, which guarantees an in-state tuition cost of \$22,000 or less for admitted College of Arts and Sciences students with a 3.5 GPA or higher.

She also successfully completed the University's comprehensive \$200 million *Forever Yours* fundraising campaign, raising a record-breaking \$207.2 million, thanks to many generous gifts from Bulldogs and friends. The campaign aims to preserve and enhance every significant aspect of the Redlands experience for many generations of future Bulldogs.

Her future plans for the University include enhancing the student experience, led in

part by a new student-focused strategic plan. She also aims to build upon the University's recent designation as a Hispanic Serving Institution.

Newkirk came to Redlands from South Carolina, where she was president of Converse University. Under her leadership, Converse developed an innovative strategic plan, launched its first doctoral degree program, expanded its master's degree offerings, and reorganized the institution to open a coeducational residential college alongside its traditional women's college. *(continued on page 3)*

Elections Finally Over – How'd We Do in '22?

Kathi Harper, Public Policy Chair, AAUW California The election is finally over! In addition to an end to the non-stop requests for donations, AAUW members can be pretty happy with the results. Here are a few highlights:

- 1 woman each was added to the U.S. House and the U.S. Senate, bringing the numbers to 124 (H) and 25 (S)
- Of the total of 149, 54 are women of color
- We lost the most powerful woman in government (Nancy Pelosi) but still have a woman on the Minority leadership team, Minority Whip Katherine Clark
- Governors of 12 states are now women
- 23% of all mayors across the nation are women, including our brand new and **first** female mayor of Los Angeles, Karen Bass
- 20 women won new seats in the California Legislature and 30 female incumbents were re-elected, bringing the total to 50 but still just 42%
- All executive positions in California except Governor are filled by women, including Secretary of State, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, and Controller, as well as the Senate Pro Tem
- Proposition 1 prevailed and women's right to control their own reproductive choices is now enshrined in our constitution.

And here are some fun facts:

- Only 3.2% of all members of Congress to date have been women
- California has sent more women to Congress than any other state a total of 47 to date
- Vermont is the only state that has never sent a woman to either the House or the Senate

The State Public Policy committee thanks each and every AAUW California member who voted, who assisted in our Voter Education (VE) campaign by spreading our messages on social media, who took the pledge to vote for Prop 1 (we had 437 sign up!), and who worked within their branches to do their own VE events.
