

If you have previously preordered a book through Redlands branch, those books will be available to pick up at the February branch meeting or you can contact Sue



# Lobby Days are Here Again....

Save the Dates .... March 21<sup>st</sup> and March 22<sup>nd</sup> are the AAUW CA scheduled Lobby Days, so mark your calendars and be sure to sign up to participate when our Lobby Day registration arrives in your January mailbox *(use link above.*)

Advocating for our top 3 priority bills is fundamental to achieving our legislative priorities by addressing economic security for all women, providing equal access to public education, and insuring social and racial justice for all members of society. We need all members on board and will be counting on you to reach out to our elected officials in the CA legislature.

Our Public Policy Committee will make it easy for you to do so. This year, instead of a full week, Lobby Day will consist of two days and will occur while the Legislature is in session, not on break. Hopefully, this will provide more opportunity to actually speak with a member in lieu of a staffer. Our plans are to make it hybrid – virtual and in-person. Those branches in and around Sacramento would have the option of in-person meetings at the Capitol with the remaining branches meeting virtually or in-person with staffers in the district. So there is a bit more flexibility this year as the committee feels it's beneficial to establish relationships with our elected leaders' local staff.

Our AAUW legislative Advocate will be scheduling meetings with the member offices willing to participate, and once you return your Lobby Day survey, the committee will begin to assemble branch participants and match them with Assembly and Senate districts in order to assign teams. We will provide you with material on the bills we are supporting and have scheduled a mandatory training webinar for March 20th, so you'll have the information at your fingertips. If you have participated in Lobby Day in the past, we would love to hear from you on what worked and what didn't, please send your comments to publicpolicy@aauw-ca.org

Lobby Day is our chance to make a concerted impact on the priorities and values we, as AAUW members, hold dear. It brings out the "advocates" in all us for improving the economic and educational lives of women and girls. And goodness knows, we need that commitment now more than ever. So mark those calendars and join us on Lobby Day/s.

### Pass Area 8th Grade Girls STEM Conference

By the time you read this, we will have hosted our 22<sup>nd</sup> Pass Area 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Girls STEM Conference at Mt. San Jacinto College in San Jacinto. Students from the Beaumont Unified School District and from the Banning Unified School District took school buses along with a dozen school staff to attend a day of workshops led by women in STEM professions, a great motivational talk by our treasured Amber Jazairi, and lunch in the college cafeteria.

Members of our branch of AAUW were present for a myriad of conference jobs. Some were Hosts to support each of the STEM professionals in their workshops. Some were Guides who help students find their way around the campus. And many others distributed folders, supervised the lunch, and checked in the speakers. We were also assisted by students from the Mt. San Jacinto College Honors Enrichment Program. (Remember the branch meeting in which Judy Cannon described the Honors program at Crafton Hills College? The program at MSJC is quite similar.)

Students were welcomed to the college at the beginning of the conference by Joyce Johnson, the Provost for Instruction who came to the college first as a nursing professor and then served as Dean of Allied Health. Tricia Stubbs welcomed everyone on behalf of AAUW Redlands and Theresa Lantz introduced Amber Jazairi. Amber remained at the conference through the lunch periods so that girls could meet her and take selfies with her.

We thank Mt. San Jacinto College for making this conference possible on the San Jacinto Campus. Lizabeth Bowles has worked with us tirelessly every year to be sure the spaces, the lunches, and the details are just right.

Thank you to all of our AAUW members for their support of this conference! The conference goes a long way towards helping AAUW fulfill its mission to promote equity for girls and women. Because of this conference experience, we expect that at least a few more young women will feel encouraged to follow their hearts and will develop the confidence to pursue education and then careers in STEM fields. School staff and AAUW volunteers always learn new things at these conferences as well.

# AAUW California Celebrates Black Women in History for Black History Month, February 2023

Many Black women have made significant contributions to history, thought, society, innovation, science, government, civil rights, women's rights, and much more. For Black History month we celebrate the achievements of but a few:

<u>Sojourner Truth</u>, a former slave, became an outspoken advocate for abolition, temperance, and civil and women's rights (1797-1883).



Rosa Parks and Claudette Colvin (age 15) helped initiate the Civil Rights movement by refusing to give up their seats to white men on Montgomery, Alabama buses. Their actions inspired resulted in the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that bus segregation was unconstitutional.

<u>Dorothy Jean Dandridge</u> was an actress, singer and dancer, the first African American film star to be nominated for the Academy Award for Best Actress for her performance in Carmen Jones (1954).

<u>Katherine Johnson</u>, a brilliant mathematician, was one of three Black students to integrate West Virginia's graduate schools. Her greatest contribution was to space exploration through her calculations synching Apollo's Lunar Module with the lunar-orbiting Module. She also worked on the Space Shuttle. (1958-1986)

<u>Madam C.J. Walker</u> was considered the wealthiest African-American businesswoman in America (1911-1919), by developing and marketing a line of cosmetics and hair care products for Black women. She hired 40,000 "ambassadors" to sell her products.

Shirley Chisholm was the first Black woman elected to Congress in 1968. She served as a representative from New York for 14 years, was the first Black candidate to run for president in the 1972 race, and founded the Congressional Black Caucus in 1971 and the Congressional Women's Caucus in 1977.

<u>Mae Jemison</u> became the first Black woman to fly to space on the space shuttle Endeavour. She was also the first Black woman admitted to the astronaut training program, in 1987.

<u>Toni Morrison</u> released her novel Beloved in 1987, winner of the Pulitzer Prize, based on the true story of an African American enslaved woman. In 1993, Morrison became the first Black woman to win the Nobel Prize in Literature.

<u>Oprah Winfrey</u>, born into poverty in rural Mississippi to a single teenage mother, molested as a child and pregnant at 14, became the most influential woman in the world by many accounts. An American talk show host, television producer, actress, author, and philanthropist, she was the richest African-American of the 20th century and was once the world's only black billionaire.
