April Branch Meeting San Bernardino County District Attorney Jason Anderson

Jason Anderson served as a deputy district attorney for the County of San Bernardino from 1998 until 2014. In this capacity, he worked as a prosecutor handling a variety of serious cases, particularly in the crimes against children unit for thirteen years. In 2014, he entered the private practice of law in Rancho Cucamonga. In 2018, Mr.

Anderson was elected the 36th District Attorney of San Bernardino County and he was reelected in June 2022. His current term ends January 2027. Mr. Andersons' mission includes respecting and inspiring confidence in the rule of law, supporting victims of crime and restoring a culture of service and accountability to the San Bernardino County District Attorney's Office.

Mr. Anderson graduated from Regent University School of Law in Virginia in 1996. Since 2004, he has been an adjunct professor of law teaching a Criminal Procedure and Trial Advocacy Class at the University of La Verne College Of Law.

In 2008, he received the Jennifer Brooks Lawyer of the Year Award from the Western San Bernardino County Bar Association. In 2012, he received the Above and Beyond Award from the National Crime Survivors Organization for his work on behalf of victims of crime. In 2018, Mr. Anderson received the George W. Porter Criminal Trial Attorney Award from the San Bernardino County Bar Association.





AAUW California will hold its 2023 Lobby Days on March 21 and 22, 2023. AAUW members will meet with their state representatives and/or their staff to inform them about AAUW and advocate for their support of priority bills. Meetings may be held in person with staffers in the district office, or virtually via Zoom.



GOV TREK

GOV TREK is a new CA-AAUW virtual program for High School Junior and Senior girls. We are now half-way through the 5, 2 hour virtual sessions (every other Saturday), with

about 60 girls and 18 adult facilitators participating. The Redlands Branch Public Policy group has made this program one of our projects for the year. Three HS girls from our area and one branch member are participating. Although there have been some technical glitches, it is clear that the CA-AAUW Public Policy Committee has done an incredible job of conceiving and organizing the program, which is "designed to elevate the next generation of females to pursue careers in public service".



Each 2-hour virtual session has included speeches by lobbyists, campaign managers, elected officials and speech writers wo have been involved in local campaigns and have made the idea of working on a political campaign exciting and attainable. The girls have been randomly assigned to a team of 6 with 2 break-out room facilitators. The members of each team have chosen roles that they want to play in a team competition to create a realistic campaign simulation. Each team choses an office to run for (e.g. city council), a campaign issue (e.g. health care) and the voter demographic to focus on (e.g. Hispanics). This has been a lot to accomplish in 10 hours (5, 2 hour sessions). With two more sessions to go, we'll see how it goes.

You are all invite to attend the finale on Saturday March 25, 2023 from 10 am – 12:30 pm. Listen to inspirational remarks from Senator Toni G. Atkins, then watch the final competition between eight teams of smart, talented young women who are exploring careers in public service. They have spent four Saturdays crafting a realistic campaign simulation for this competition. Who will win? Who has the best stump speech, the best campaign flyers, and the best voter outreach plan?



AAUW Redlands Branch STEM INITIATIVES

29th Annual STEM Conference Takes Place!

On a particularly blustery March 1, 600 8th graders arrived at the University of Redlands to participate in the 29th Annual STEM Conference for 8th Grade Girls produced by the Redlands Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW).

While at the conference, each student participated in two STEM workshops led by female STEM professionals. These included engaging introductions to topics such as using forensics to solve crimes, geology & water quality, renewable energy, physics, mental health, mapping, and many more. Each student participated in a STEM Career Fair during which they got to meet and chat with three different STEM professionals about their careers. The students ate lunch in Irvine Commons and ended the day with Keynote Speaker Amber Jazairi, noted writer, actor, film producer, director, and public speaking national champion in Memorial Chapel.

When asked what was the most important message learned by participating in the conference, student responses included the following:

"Planning our future is important and we should do something we love."

"You can accomplish great things so don't hold yourself back and don't give up."

"Try lots of things to see what you like."

"To follow your dreams and don't ever give up."

"I learned to be open-minded and experience new careers."

"Try my hardest no matter what."

"The most important message is that you are important and can do whatever you want to do. And that we all have to stick together."

"Believe in yourself."

"Don't let people tell you you can't."

"I never really was interested in STEM but this really interested me seeing all these jobs and learning what they do. And the speech it made me passionate to be a woman."

If these quotes are any indication, then the conference is meeting our goal of empowering young women to participate in STEM courses and careers.

The Redlands Branch of AAUW has been producing STEM Conferences for students from Redlands and Yucaipa middle schools for nearly 30 years. Additionally, our branch provides a STEM Conference for girls from Banning and Beaumont middle schools in January of each year.

In order to provide the conference for over 600 students, AAUW recruits

dozens of STEM professionals to share their experiences and dozens of AAUW members & volunteers to make sure the students get to the workshops, STEM Fair, lunch and keynote speech. AAUW Redlands is grateful to the

University of Redlands and to our many community sponsors for their unswerving support of this event over the years. Among the major sponsors are Optimist Club of Redlands, Rotary Club of Yucaipa, Beaver Medical Group, and Inland SoCal United Way. The conference would never happen without community-wide support. In this newsletter, however, we want to note and appreciate the hours of organizational planning by STEM Committee members, the energy of our on-ite volunteers, and the commitment of our branch to this endeavor.
