June Branch Meeting

It is with great pride that I introduce our speaker for our June Branch Meeting, Majority Leader Eloise Reyes. Eloise Gómez Reyes was elected to the California State Assembly in November 2016 to represent California's 47th Assembly District. She was re-elected to represent California's 50th Assembly District in November 2022. Now serving her fourth term, she was appointed by Speaker Anthony Rendon as Majority Leader, serving as the first Latina in that role. In addition, she is a member of the Judiciary Committee, Utilities and Energy Committee, Aging and Long-Term Care,

Legislative Ethics Committee, Labor Committee and Budget Sub-2 Committee. Eloise graduated from Colton High School and received her Associates of Arts degree from San Bernardino Valley College. After completing her undergraduate degree at the University of Southern California, Eloise went on to earn her law degree from Loyola Law School. Due to the lack of access to quality legal services in her community she became the first Latina to open her own law firm in the Inland Empire.

Majority Leader Reyes is a luminary whose achievements in driving change on issues that impact Californians are nothing short of remarkable. With great passion, tireless dedication, and unwavering commitment, she has brought about significant progress in the political and social landscape of women's issues. In our last Redlands branch newsletter, we asked you to hold off from renewing your membership until you received further notice from us. We're pleased to announce that all systems are ready and members with pending renewal dates can now renew your annual AAUW membership dues.

Your renewal dues are due by June 30, 2023, if you originally joined prior to March, 2022. Members who joined March, 2022, or later will have a renewal deadline that is 12 months after when they joined.


Please welcome the following new members!

applications and carried out in-person interviews in order to make the selections. The girls are students at Park View Middle School in Yucaipa, Clement Middle School in Redlands, Nicolet Middle School in Banning, and San Gorgonio Middle School in Beaumont.

Seven of the girls will attend camp on the UC San Diego campus, four will be at Whittier College, and four will participate in the virtual camp. Each camp will have activities all day and each includes evening workshops.

Kathryn Brown organized two pizza parties so the girls and their families could meet other campers and ask questions of girls who attended in the past. Aileen Buckley of ESRI donated ESRI backpacks and books about women in GIS. The backpacks were stocked by the committee with graph paper notebooks, colored pencils, and Tech Trek bears. 

- Aug 23: The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek by Michelle Richardson



AAUW CA Gov Trek Program



Happy Pride Month!

Happy June and Happy Pride Month!

Every June since 1970, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer or Questioning (LGBTQ+) Pride Month is celebrated to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan. At the time, The Stonewall Inn was the most popular gay bar in Manhattan. Until 1966 it was illegal to serve alcohol to a gay person, and until 1969, homosexuality was a criminal offense. On the morning of June 28, 1969, police raided the bar for the sale of illegal alcohol. As word got out about the raid, thousands of protestors came out, and the protests lasted for six days. These protests sparked the beginning of the Gay Liberation Movement.

The Stonewall Inn is now a National Monument. In 2016, President Obama established the first LGBTQ+ National Park in the 7.7 acres surrounding The Stonewall Inn, and in 2019, the city of New York honored LGBTQ+ activists Marsha P. Johnson and Sylvia Rivera, with a statue for their activism. They were prominent in the Stonewall Uprising, and according to the city of New York, this was the "first permanent, public artwork recognizing transgender women in the world."

Since the Stonewall Uprising, there have been many significant advances for the LGBTQ+ community, like same-sex marriage and the passage of the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Hate Crimes Prevention Act of 2009. There is still a long way to go for equitable treatment for all, but that's why it's exciting to work with an organization like AAUW on its mission of achieving a more equitable society.

For further information, the Library of Congress has compiled a wonderful resource guide. LGBTQ+ Studies: A Resource Guide serves as an introduction into the excellent collection of LGBTQ+ resources available at the Library of Congress.
