April Branch Meeting Rachel Tolber - Chief of Police -Redlands Police Department



Redlands Police Chief Rachel Tobler will speak on "Positive Impacts of Women in Law Enforcement" at the April 13 Branch meeting. Chief Tolber will give an update on the Redlands

department as a whole, report on local community trust-building programs within the department, and address the social, philosophical and practical impacts of increasing numbers of women in law enforcement.

Last year, Rachel Tobler was named Redlands Chief of Police –the first female police chief in the city's history.

She had been serving as interim chief and, prior to that, as a commander for the Special Services Bureau.

Tolber was first hired by the Redlands Police Department as a student research intern in 1977. The following year she became a police officer and has served the department continuously since then in a variety of positions, including patrol officer and supervisor, detective, investigations supervisor, crisis negotiator, field training officer, training manager and professional standards oversight.

Chief Tolber holds a bachelor's degree in psychology and sociology (University of Redlands, 1998); a master's degree in criminology, law and society (U.C. Irvine, 2006); a master's degree in applied criminology (University of Cambridge, 2011) and completed the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training Command College (2021).

Chief Tolber's areas of expertise include research on evidence-based policing, re-entry issues, restorative justice, technology, and women in policing.

Meet Tech Trek Alumni at our APRIL 13th Branch Meeting



Our STEM Tech Trek committee invited a few of last year's Tech Trek alumni to our April 13th ranch meeting. We will show our short 3.5 minute video from one of our camps and the girls will share a few special moments of their experiences.

In order to be considered for a sponsorship to Tech Trek, students must first be nominated by their 7th grade math, science, or technology teachers. Of the 24 nominees who were invited to apply for our week-long Tech Trek STEM camps we had 20 completed applications. A great response! Our Tech Trek Team is busy reading and scoring the girls applications and setting up interviews at their school.

16 of those applications are to attend the Tech Trek Residential Camps held at Whittier College or UC San Diego and 4 girls are applying for the Tech Trek Virtual Camp. Redlands Branch has been allotted 12 resident camp slots so we have a difficult decision to only select 12 residential campers and 2 alternates. The cost to sponsor a residential camper is \$1100. Our allotment at the virtual camp is not limited by space, only by funds available. We have budgeted for 2 girls at a cost of \$500 per girl. Also, we would like to offer the girls who are not selected for the residential camp the possibility to go to Virtual Camp.

You can help make this happen. At the April Branch meeting, we will be accepting cash, check and credit card donations for Tech Trek. We hope that you will continue to support this AAUW STEM program. Tech Trek is a summer camp for middle school girls focusing on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). Campers spend one week on a university campus – they live in the dorms, eat in the cafeteria, attend labs and classes, and learn what it might be like to be a college student.

In addition to the seven residential Tech Trek camps, girls can also attend the Tech Trek Virtual Camp. Virtual Tech Trek is the newest week-long camp in AAUW California's STEM offerings. Developed in response to Covid 19 in 2020, the cloudbased camp provides campers remote access to activities, new friends, virtual field trips, and role models to help foster STEM engagement and interest in STEM studies and careers without ever having to leave home (other than to pick up their camp supplies)!

AAUW California Board of Directors Supports Eliminating the Membership Degree Requirement FEBRUARY 17, 2024

This April, we will have the opportunity to practice the inclusion that we value by voting to welcome any person who is passionate about equity for women into AAUW, whether they have a degree or not. AAUW National is proposing a bylaws amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership. On

January 20th, the AAUW California Board of Directors unanimously approved a statement of support for the bylaws change.

Throughout the past 143 years, AAUW members never stopped advocating for education while expanding our focus to ensuring policies around maternity leave, reproduction rights, equal pay, and policies against sexual harassment and violence against women. Welcoming those without a degree will not change who we are and what we are working towards- it will enhance our efforts by including anyone who is as passionate as we are about equity for women and girls.

We encourage you to practice the inclusion our founding members worked for and vote "yes"- watch for your ballot in April. Together in equity, AAUW California State Board

AAUW Redlands Branch STEM INITIATIVES

30th Annual STEM Conference Takes Place!

Sunny weather welcomed nearly 600 8th grade girls and school staff (as well as over 150 adult volunteers) as they descended upon the University of Redlands campus on February 28th for our 30th Annual AAUW Redlands STEM Conference—a day designed to whet the students' interest in learning more about Science, Technology, Engineering and Math.

The conference started before 9 AM, when busloads of students began to pull up at Memorial Chapel, where some schools took group photos on the steps before entering. After welcoming words from our co-President, Marilyn Shankar, and Dr. Nicol Howard from the University of Redlands, the audience, which included RUSD Superintendent Juan Cabral, listened



while Isis (formerly Amber Jazairi) delivered a mesmerizing Keynote address which had the girls thinking about and yelling out, "Power! Passion! Pursuit! Perseverance!" She has a unique understanding of young people and encourages our 8th graders to be brave and to be strong. She remained on campus throughout the day and chatted with many students during lunch.

Each girl participated in two separate workshops on campus. Among the

activities they might have had were crystal-making, working with thin films, making scientific observations of a blob they created, working through crime scenes, and designing cars.

After the two workshops, students were treated to lunch in the Commons, as well as participated in the STEM Fair. The STEM Fair provided an opportunity for the students to sit in a small group with a woman professional to ask about how they got their education, training and what they like about their jobs and careers. We laugh that it is like speed dating, in that the participants change tables every ten minutes so that they have an opportunity to meet three individual professionals.

This year's conference benefitted from the assistance of several students from Crafton Hills College, some of whom are in their Honors Program. One, Brianna Arellano, came just for the day to be a Guide. Four of the Crafton Hills College students who are current Branch members, attended the conference as 8th graders: Jayleen Martinez, Kyra Ruvalcaba, Malia Ullrich and Zofia Owerkowicz. Rose and Malia served as conference Guides, Zofia served as a STEM Fair Leader, explaining environmental activism, and Kyra was a guide last year, but this year put her tech skills to work helping our speakers with conference-day tech issues.

The eighth graders and school staff came from the Yucaipa-Calimesa Unified School District and Redlands Unified, as well as the public charter schools within each of the districts. We are very grateful to the school staff, the district administrators, and the bus drivers who made this possible.

They are so clever and their conversations with the students can be life-changing. Some quotes from the students' conference evaluations:

> "Everything was amazing...I only wish I was there longer." "Science classes will give you a head start in college." "The most important message: be yourself, be kind, be proud of

yourself and not insecure."

"I'll find my thing if I look hard enough."

"Mistakes can also help us learn."

"This speaker was wonderful! I'm not particularly interested in water, but she made me feel interested and, honestly, empowered."

"The food was delicious...much better than school lunch."
