#### President's Corner: Heather Abushanab

As we look towards the AAUW Redlands branch membership meeting, it's a good time to remember why we joined AAUW and how being a member of AAUW has impacted us. I joined AAUW Redlands branch in 2011, very shortly after moving to Redlands from the east coast. At the time, I didn't know anything about AAUW. My mother-in-law had been a member of AAUW for many years in all the various places she had lived. She found the Redlands branch website and was incredibly impressed

with the varied activities of this branch. She suggested it as a way for me to meet like-minded people in my new community.

So, I bravely attended the branch membership meeting alone that September and promptly joined Reading and the Rainbow, California Cuisine, and the couples Bridge Group. I dipped my toe into the STEM committee and attended the Great Decisions discussion group faithfully. During that first year, I met so many interesting women and proceeded to run into them all over town: in the grocery store, at the library, at the Lincoln Shrine Dinner and even at my church. Kay Dobbertin took me to lunch and told me all about the branch. Nelda Stuck wasn't afraid to suggest I participate in the STEM Conference the first day she met me, and it wasn't long before I was asked to help with the data for the STEM Conference. I attended both the San Gorgonio Pass area conference and the Redlands conference that year and I could not have been more impressed with the two events.

A bit later, I was asked to serve on the board as treasurer. That year, Kathy Toister was the branch president, and I was incredibly impressed by the board activities and the commitment of the board to the ideals of AAUW. Since the treasurer checks in the guests at branch meetings, I was able to meet nearly every branch member that year and became familiar with many of you. It was during this same year that I really started to understand the mission of AAUW. Through the STEM Conferences, Tech Trek, and the NYM Scholarships the branch makes a tangible difference in the lives of women and girls in our area. During the years following that time, our branch has increased our support for women and girls by adding the Speech Trek program, a High School Scholarship program and revamping our College and University Partnerships by including scholarships to the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) for students at our partner schools and expanding the number of partnership schools. We partnered with Zonta Club of Redlands to bring Lunafest to Redlands and figured out how to continue that activity despite the disbandment of Zonta and the cancellation of Lunafest by the sponsoring company. We now have a vibrant FilmFest which supports many of these amazing mission projects.

Not too long after that, I went back to work part-time. I had less time for the fun parts of Redlands branch, but I became even more committed to the missions of AAUW. Teaching at CSUSB in the Physics department, I saw firsthand how lives can be changed and improved by access to education and leadership experiences. I served as both Membership VP and later as STEM Chair during that time. And once I stopped working, I finally felt the timing was right to take on the presidency of the branch. Last year was an amazing honor to work so closely with Marilyn Shankar and the rest of the board. Since we did not have a president-elect ready to take over this year, I agreed to continue an additional year in this role, knowing that Amy Bisek and Kathryn Brown would support me as full partners in running the board this year. My AAUW Redlands branch journey has been amazing. I'm awed by what this branch can do and by the many amazing, talented women we have in our branch.

It is so easy to invite new people to participate in AAUW Redlands branch because we are inviting them into a truly unique and special group of people with an incredible mission. AAUW Redlands branch advances equity for women and girls through education, empowerment and advocacy. Such a short sentence to explain everything we do!

# **AAUW Community Engagement**



AAUW Redlands Public Policy Committee in partnership with the University of Redlands Public Policy Program is once again hosting two candidate forums for local voters to get to know the candidates for Redlands offices that are on the ballot in the November 5 election.

At 7 p.m. Thursday, October 10, in the U of R Casa Loma Room, the committee will present a forum for Redlands City Council candidates. All five candidates for the two seats have been invited.

A panel of University of Redlands Political Science Prof. Renee Van Vechten, U of R Prof. Emerita of Economics Dorene Isenberg and AAUW Redlands Public Policy Committee Chair Cassie MacDuff will ask each candidate a series of questions. Following those, the audience's questions, submitted on 3x5 cards available at the forum, will be screened by AAUW volunteers and given to the panel to ask. Afterwards, candidates may stay a while and chat with attendees, if they wish.

A forum for Redlands Unified School District candidates will be presented on Wednesday, Oct. 23 on Zoom. All seven candidates for the three seats have been invited. The same panel will ask a series of questions, followed by audience questions, submitted online as guests register for the Zoom and sorted by the panel. More information about how to register for the Zoom will be presented as soon as available. Check the AAUW Redlands Facebook in the coming weeks.

# **AAUW Redlands STEM Conference Update: Progress is Happening!**

On January 9 and March 4, 2025, AAUW Redlands will again (for the 32<sup>nd</sup> year) sponsor our annual STEM Conferences for 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Girls. The primary goal of the conferences is to encourage our local middle school girls to embrace high school classes in science, technology, engineering and math, thereby equipping themselves with a high school transcript which will enable them to pursue degrees and eventually careers in fields where knowledge of STEM subjects is crucial.



The following excerpts from a recent LA Times article describe some success toward that goal:

"In a milestone breakthrough, more than half of Caltech's incoming undergraduate class in the fall will be women for the first time in its 133-year history. The class of 113 women and 109 men comes 50 years after Caltech graduated its first class of undergraduate women, who were admitted in 1970...

"Caltech isn't the first California educational institution to reach gender parity in STEM. Harvey Mudd College, a small private institution in Claremont, was an early leader in diversity. The college enrolled more women than men in 2010 for the first time in its history and in 2014 graduated more women than men in engineering. Today, women make up 52.8% of majors in computer science, 50.5% in engineering and 68.2% in mathematical and computational biology at Harvey Mudd...At UC Berkeley, another powerful producer of STEM graduates, nearly half of students majoring in those fields identify as women or nonbinary, but the field they enter varies significantly. They make up more than two-thirds of students in biological and biomedical sciences, but about one-third in engineering, computer and informational sciences, and mathematics and statistics..."

"Gloria L. Blackwell, chief executive of the American Association of University Women, lauded Caltech's achievement as crucial progress in reducing the substantial gap of women in science, technology, engineering and math. Blackwell said, "Although women hold about 60% of degrees in biological sciences, they represent only about 18% in computer science and 20% in engineering...Research has shown that boys are not better at math and science than girls, but a persistent message in society says otherwise — and especially discourages Latinas and Black girls from pursuing the fields because they face discrimination and have less access to role models, resources and opportunities... Even as more women study science, technology, engineering and math, they remain significantly underrepresented in the related workforce. Women hold about 45% of STEM degrees but make up only 28% of the workforce in those fields."
