President's Corner: Heather Abushanab



One of the benefits of being on the branch board, and even more so as the branch president, is getting a very "big picture" view of the branch. I've seen how our membership has rebounded after Covid and now has exploded well beyond any numbers we have had in the past. I've gotten to hear ideas about various directions for our branch from thoughtful board and branch members. I get reports from committees and interest groups even when I can't attend,

and I have learned a lot about how things operate in our branch.

Our membership is now the largest it has ever been. Some of that growth came from sad circumstances with the closing of the Hemet branch and the slow decline of the Riverside branch. Some of it has come from an unexpected source: our FilmFest. Over the last two years, many women who had never heard of AAUW before were invited to FilmFest by friends or even stumbled upon it while looking for an evening activity. There they enjoyed a welcomed night out but were also introduced to the mission of AAUW and made aware of the amazing branch we have here in Redlands.

Many of the women we have gained through this avenue are younger than our traditional, recently retired, new member demographic. These younger women have ~continued on page 3

May Branch Meeting: "Serving Immigrants and Refugees in our Midst" Anne Thorward, President of Newcomers Access Center (NAC)



Anne grew up in Los Angeles. Her first career was teaching elementary school in LA and for two years in Europe. Upon returning to the US, she worked in real estate management followed by a long career as a financial advisor. Then a serendipitous encounter changed the course of her life.

When a neighbor mentioned that a ninth-grade Syrian refugee student needed tutoring, Thorward answered the call. Through this

connection, she met the student's family, other refugees, volunteers, neighbors, faith groups, politicians and more.

Having done social justice work all her life, in 2017, a friend suggested that she start an ACCESS organization, thus Newcomers Access Center was born. NAC serves immigrant and refugee families throughout Southern California.

less time available to them because they are still juggling work, family, and other responsibilities. They join AAUW for the same reasons we all joined: (1) the mission of advancing equity for women and girls through education, empowerment and advocacy, and (2) the fellowship of a diverse group of women who are committed to the mission. Their schedules make it difficult for them to participate in many of our interest groups. They attend branch meetings when they can and mingle with other members, but such a large event makes getting to know people challenging.

This month, we held our first informal Meet-Up event targeted at this younger group of women. Tansu Philip, the owner of Viva La Boba on Orange Street, agreed to open her shop an hour early on a Saturday so that we could have a place to gather informally and chat with each other. Roughly a dozen women dropped in to try out Tansu's Boba (or coffee for some!) and enjoyed an hour of conversation and fellowship. Many people who could not attend expressed hope that there will be more of these scheduled in the future. Amy, Kathryn, and I will be looking for opportunities over the next few months to schedule a few more and exploring with those interested how we might form a new interest group to meet the needs of this younger demographic. It is never our intention to exclude anyone from these events, so if you are feeling younger on the day of one of these events, please come and Meet Up! As plans develop, more information will be provided in upcoming newsletters.

Members will receive emails from

vote@simplyvoting.com with their unique Elector ID and Password to vote*. AAUW members are asked to vote on amendments to the Public Policy Priorities and national bylaws, in addition to electing members to the AAUW Board of Directors.

AAUW California election: April 26 to May 16 Members will receive an email message containing a personal invitation to vote*. There will be a link to click that will take them to their ballot. No password or code needs to be entered. AAUW CA members are asked to vote on AAUW California dues increase and the proposed 2025-2027 Public Policy Priorities, in addition to electing members to the AAUW California Board of Directors.

*Members who do not have an email address on file will receive information and a ballot via postal mail.

National Membership Dues Update

The AAUW National Board approved a modest dues adjustment — \$2 per year over the next two years.

Starting April 1, 2025, individual National member dues will be \$74, AAUW CA dues \$20, AAUW Redlands branch \$31.

On April 1, 2026, National dues will change to \$76.

Tech Trek

This is an exciting time for Tech Trek! The Redlands Branch Tech Trek team has just finished conducting interviews with the 12 girls who submitted applications from our four assigned middle schools: Nicolet Middle School in Banning, San Gorgonio Middle School in Beaumont, Park View Middle School in Yucaipa and Clement Middle School in Redlands.

We also had the opportunity to present the girls who attended last summer's Tech Trek camps with their certificates. Last year 13 girls from the four schools completed Tech Trek Camp and earned a total of 20 certificates! Seven girls attended Residential Camp at San Diego and Whittier and six girls attended Virtual Tech Trek Camp. All 13 girls are now AAUW Tech Trek Alumni and Tech Trek Ambassadors!

Tech Trek is a one-week summer camp for middle school girls focusing on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). Campers either attend virtually online or attend in person on a university campus. They live in the dorms, eat in the cafeteria, attend labs and classes, and learn what it might be like to be a college student.

To be considered for a sponsorship to Tech Trek, students must first be nominated by their 7th grade math, science, or technology teachers.



Several girls said that their experience at camp was "*amazing*"! They had the opportunity to meet new people and were excited to be part of something that "*motivates young women to do something in areas that are male dominated*". They were exposed to "*a*



lot of new interesting things and able to find something that really interests you". The girls were equally enthusiastic about both Residential Camp and Virtual Camp.

This year acceptance letters will be going out to congratulate four girls who were selected to attend the University of San Diego Residential Camp, four girls who were selected to attend Whittier College Residential Camp and four girls who have been selected to attend Virtual Tech Trek Camp and named as alternates for Residential camp if any of our selected girls are unable to attend. It was delightful to meet the girls, learn about their interests and hear their enthusiasm for science, technology, engineering and math. Your support of Tech Trek makes a difference. Mother's Day as a national holiday in the United States has roots in the 19th century and the efforts of Anna Jarvis, who campaigned for a day to honor mothers after her own mother's death. Celebrations of motherhood can be traced back to ancient civilizations, with festivals honoring mother goddesses like Cybele and Rhea. The Christian tradition of "Mothering Sunday" also existed, a day when people returned to their mother church and honored their mothers.

In the 1870s, suffragette Julia Ward Howe wrote the "Mother's Day Proclamation," calling for mothers to unite for world peace. Another precursor was Ann Reeves Jarvis, who organized "Mother's Day Work Clubs" to improve public health and sanitation. In 1908, Anna Jarvis organized a small gathering in Grafton, West Virginia, marking the first widely recognized Mother's Day celebration. Anna Jarvis' relentless efforts eventually led to the official proclamation of Mother's Day as a national holiday in 1914 by President Woodrow Wilson.

Social Justice Conference at the University of Redlands

Several of us were pleased to contribute to strengthening our relationship with the University of Redlands on March 21 by staffing a table for AAUW at the university's Social Justice Conference, held at the Orton Center. We were invited by student Lila Alizadeh, who especially wanted us to be there because our organization values social justice issues in education. Those of us who did shifts at the table were able to meet with students and faculty who dropped by, hear some of the presenters and attend the luncheon keynote speaker, who reported on a study of the lives of sex workers in Los Angeles who are parents, and how they manage, based on focus group discussions with the research participants. Student presentations included topics as diverse as warehouses and their impacts on health in the Inland Empire, especially in linguistically isolated neighborhoods, and another on writing narratives to educate about food and culture, based on a student's learning her South Asian heritage from her grandmother.



Legislative advocacy is one of the primary missions of the American Association of University Women. Your Public Policy Committee was proud to represent you by lobbying for the three bills that AAUW California's public policy team chose as the top priorities for this legislative session.

We lobbied in support of SB 418, which would protect health care patients from discrimination, and SB 771, which would hold social media platforms civilly responsible for illegal hate speech. We also lobbied in opposition to AB 579 (authored by Castillo) which would exclude gender identity as a factor in deciding whether to remove a child from an abusive home.

The Public Policy Committee met over a weekend in mid-March for our most important meeting of the year, to set the Legislative Agenda for 2025. Prior to the meeting, our committee collectively evaluated over 60 bills related to AAUW's mission and Public Policy Priorities. During our two-day marathon session, we carefully considered each bill. We then voted to select and prioritize the top 25 bills, leaving room to add a few more bills that we know will be coming to us in the next few weeks.

Our three "A" priority bills are SB 771 "Social Media Platforms Endangering Californians", AB 579 "Yaeli's Law", and SB 418 "Ensure Equal Access to Care for All". All three of the "A" priority bills this year fall under the Social Justice pillar of our Public Policy Priorities.

The first "A" bill, SB 771 "Social Media Platforms Endangering Californians", is authored by Senator Henry Stern and is sponsored by AAUW California. SB 771 clarifies that a social media platform may be liable for civil penalty under existing law if and when its algorithms or AI aid or abet individual users who are engaging in already unlawful intimidation of others in online spaces. While hateful speech is problematic, it is not illegal. However, it can cross the line into illegal action. When hate speech is "brought to the doorstep" of marginalized communities, for example if someone maliciously posts anti-immigrant messages on the virtual Facebook wall of an immigrant family, they are engaging in unlawful intimidation, terrorism, and threat. While social media platforms are not responsible for the speech of individual users, aspects of their platform such as algorithms or AI can be complicit in the targeting of marginalized groups, which is unlawful. Social media companies have recently intentionally turned away from providing safeguards that they previously provided for targeted vulnerable communities. They should be held accountable for that decision, in light of the real-world impacts of proliferation of online hate and their complicity in unlawful intimidation.

The second "A" bill, to which we are taking an opposition position, is AB 579 "Yaeli's Law" authored by Assemblymember Leticia Castillo. This bill rests on the premise that denial of support for youth self-identity,

including refusal to use a child's name and pronouns, or refusal to provide or allow their gender-affirming care, is not harmful and therefore should not be considered child abuse under the law, and, accordingly, not be allowed as a basis for custody or removal decisions. This is problematic. Research shows that transgender children are more likely to experience anxiety and depression and are at greater risk of substance abuse and homelessness when they live in households that do not accept their gender identity. We oppose this bill because every child deserves to be protected from emotional and physical abuse, including the right to be removed from a harmful household to a more healthy environment.

The third "A" bill is SB 418 "Ensure Equal Access to Care for All" authored by Senator Caroline Menjivar. This bill would prohibit a health plan or a health insurance provider from denying coverage or denying benefits to a person based upon their race, color, national origin, age, disability, or sex - including sex characteristics such as intersex traits, pregnancy, and gender identity. Access to gender-affirming care is a fundamental aspect of health equity and human rights. SB 418 will protect against discrimination on the basis of sex, while also sending a powerful message of support to the LGBTQ+ community, affirming that their needs matter. Creating an environment where all individuals can express their identities without fear is foundational to a strong democracy.
