Leadership Redlands Scholarship 2026



The Redlands Chamber of Commerce's Leadership Redlands program develops the next generation of active leaders for our community. Decision-makers from local businesses, government agencies, non profits, and higher learning contribute to a 9-month interactive program devoted to educating future Redlands leaders about key regional issues at locations throughout Redlands. We will provide a \$500 scholarship to an AAUW Redlands branch member to participate in Redlands 2026. It's an amazing opportunity to see the inner workings of Redlands and poise yourself for future community contributions. The RCC application period will open in September and close by the end of October, followed by November interviews and the final awardee announcement in December 2025. The awardee will update the AAUW Redlands board periodically on things they have learned and to serve on our board during the 2026-27 or 2027-28 year. It's an amazing opportunity to discover the inner workings of Redlands, our jewel of the Inland Empire. Plus, it's an amazing opportunity to discover interesting and compelling ways you can contribute to our branch and greater community in the future. Thank You, Tech Trek Team, for a Great Year!

Our Tech Trek Committee came together to honor Denise Westcott's legacy by making 2024-25 a big success. Starting in late 2024, committee members met with middle school Counselors at Nicolet (Banning), San Geronio (Beaumont), Clement (Redlands) and Park View (Yucaipa) to share information about Tech Trek, as well as to deliver certificates of achievement to the girls who participated in Trek Tech 2024. Thereafter, the middle school science teachers at the four schools nominated a total of twenty-five 7th grade girls whom they believed would benefit from participating in Tech Trek camp, having displayed an interest in and an eagerness to learn more about STEM subjects.



The girls were invited to complete an online application (consisting of an essay and a questionnaire); the committee worked with school

Tech Trek is a one-week summer camp for middle school girls focusing on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). Campers either attend virtually online or attend in person on a university campus. They live in the dorms, eat in the cafeteria, attend labs and classes, and learn what it might be like to be a college student.

To be considered for a sponsorship to Tech Trek, students must first be nominated by their 7th grade math, science, or technology teachers.

personnel to encourage the girls and their families to finalize their applications by the Tech Trek camp deadline. Twelve applications were completed. Our committee then met to score each applicant on the quality of their essay, individual interest in or experience with STEM, participation in group activities, and interest in learning new things. The essays were inspiring!

All twelve applicants were then interviewed by members of our committee, who scored each girl on her interest and enthusiasm to learn about or pursue a potential career in STEM, openness to being away from home at camp (without access to their cell phone) and their ability to work well with others and take on new challenges. The girls were also asked about their preference for virtual or in-person camp. Meeting the girls, listening to their answers and seeing their enthusiasm was amazing!



All twelve girls demonstrated high Tech Trek camp potential, so all twelve were offered the opportunity to participate in either virtual or residential camp. Four girls accepted our AAUW Redlands scholarships to attend the week-long residential camps at Whittier College and the University of San Diego, respectively, and two girls attended virtual Tech Trek Camp. Two of the girls offered virtual Tech Trek Camp declined to participate.

In May, the girls and their families, along with the committee, were invited to attend a celebratory pizza party, where the girls were given their ESRI-provided backpacks, which included an AAUW Tech Trek teddy bear. Also present at the party were a 2024 Tech Trek alumna and her mother, giving the girls and their families the opportunity to ask any questions they had about the camping experience.

The committee has received feedback from some of the Whittier campers already! The girls RAVED about their camp experience. One of the girls had never been on an overnight away without her family before. She was initially nervous about attending camp; by the end of the week, she was sad that camp was over. Another girl also said she didn't want camp to end, and they both expressed how excited they were to make so many new friends. The girls were thrilled about meeting an astronaut and are very much looking forward to receiving autographed photographs she has promised to send. Every year, the girls and their families are clearly grateful for the opportunity to participate in Tech Trek. Tech Trek is an invaluable and rewarding experience for the girls as well as our committee. Recipients of our annual Redlands Branch AAUW High School Scholarship were announced at the award ceremonies at three Redlands high schools. The \$500 awards (direct tuition) were based on academics and school activities including athletics as well as community volunteer and/or paid work. Applicants also wrote an essay describing their commitment to AAUW goals regarding the empowerment of women. Congratulations to this diverse group of young women:



Corinne Garber, Redlands High School

Corinne has an excellent academic record, earning grades of 4 or 5 for six AP courses during her sophomore and junior years in addition to significant commitment to school and community activities. Her volunteer activities, which include being President, Captain and Tutor for the Speech and Debate program and also a founding member of the Women's Health and Safety Advocacy Club, are consistent with her career goals. After majoring in economics/political science and then going to law school, she hopes to become an attorney specializing in women's rights.

Soriya Muth, Redlands East Valley (REV) High School

In addition to cashiering at Boba Tea & Yogurt, Soriya had time for school volunteer activities and sports. She started the Asian Student Union at REV hoping to learn more about her own Cambodian culture. She placed first in Badminton Doubles in the Citrus Valley League championship. Soriya plans to attend UC Berkeley and major in chemical and environmental engineering. Her essay demonstrated her strong support of women's equity.



Mais Daraghma, Citrus Valley High School

Mais is an Arab American whose family came from Jordan but she has multi-cultural interests as reflected by her earning the California State Seal of Biliteracy for fluency in Spanish and Arabic as well as English and also her involvement in an interfaith community with Christians, Hindus, Buddhists, Muslims and others. Her awards and activities also show a strong STEM interest: Stem for All, Girls Who Code, and Science Club. She plans to major in biology at UC Irvine then on to dental school, inspired by shadowing a dentist whose work was not only about healthy teeth but increased self-esteem and confidence for the patient.



Thanks to our **High School Scholarship Committee** members for reviewing the online applications and making thoughtful choices as well as to the **Redlands Community Scholarship Foundation** for making the selection process so clearcut. Thanks also to the **Orangewood Continuation High School** counseling staff for selecting two graduating seniors to receive our cash awards of \$250. The winners have overcome some difficult challenges to develop academic success and worthwhile education and career goals that reflect the Orangewood's motto: Path to Purpose.

Nora Morehouse: Nora has maintained good grades while working and participating in athletics. She plans to enroll at Riverside Community College to obtain an associate degree in Cosmetology then pursue her ambition to become a make-up artist.



Natali Ventura: Natali has played on the soccer team and completed the school's Multi-Media pathway and was part of the SkilledUSA Competition Team for Orangewood. She will attend Crafton Hills College as the first family member to complete high school and then hopes to train in radiology.
