Co-Presidents' Corner: Amy Bisek and Kathryn Brown

The upcoming branch membership meeting has found each of us taking a look back at our own unique AAUW Redlands "Herstory."

In a few respects, our stories are alike and intertwine.

Both of us were born, raised, and graduated from college in the upper Midwest and, bottom line, fell in love with Southern California guys. Kathryn moved to Northern California in 1971. From Oakland, with an

eye toward caring for family elders and retirement. She and her husband, Jim Hendon (a Redlands native), purchased a Redlands rental property in 2004. Meanwhile, in 2009, Amy met Dennis Seaton while he was temporarily working in St Paul, MN. In 2011, when Dennis was transferred back to southern CA, Amy decided to join him and work remotely. Fun fact: they moved into the Brown/Hendon's rental property.

And we became friends.

By the end of 2011, Amy and Dennis had moved to their own Redlands home while Kathryn and Jim were semi-retired and living, as planned, in their former rental property.

After reading about the AAUW Redlands September 2012 branch membership meeting in the Redlands Daily Facts, Kathryn navigated her way solo to the Casa Loma Room, primarily in search of a book club like the one she'd participated in "up North", made up of interesting, intelligent, and friendly women. Of course, at that AAUW membership meeting she found much more on offer, not the least of which were the pleasantly persistent hands of friendship extended by branch leaders Kathy Toister and Kay Dobbertin. Kay promptly enlisted her to manage the branch reservation list, which helped her to gradually learn the names of other members and then put those names to faces at meetings and when she ran into them around town. In the ensuing years, especially after her 2015 retirement, she got to know even more members by joining the planning committees for the STEM Conference and Tech Trek, the Public Policy Committee and CHAT, participating in Great Decisions, California Cuisine and the hiking group, serving as Program VP, co-chairing the Footlighters fundraising event, working on Lunafest and now, FilmFest—all of which opened up a host of other new and rewarding friendships and opportunities to make a positive difference in the lives of women and girls.

In 2013, Amy heard about the AAUW book club and attended a session at Kathryn's home, and shortly thereafter she joined the branch. For many years while working, book club was the only activity in which Amy regularly participated. By 2016 she was regularly contributing cookies to the Footlighters event and in 2018 joined the STEM team as a guide. Also, in 2018 she became a co-chair, along with Kathryn, of the book club. Upon retiring in 2020, Amy joined the STEM planning team, 2023, joined the Fundraising committee and in 2021-23 she was our membership vp.

Over the years, we have both come to not only more fully understand and appreciate the mission of AAUW but to recognize and enjoy our own feeling of empowerment when we see, locally, the tangible differences in the lives of women and girls made by our branch.

Both of us are awed by what AAUW Redlands branch can do and by the many amazing, talented women who are our friends and colleagues.

It is very easy to invite new people to participate in AAUW Redlands because we are inviting them into a truly unique and special group of people with an incredible mission. 



Nancy Yowell Memorial Scholarship (NYMS): 2025–2026 Application Opens October 1st

We are excited to announce updates to the NYMS program and that the new application will be available on our <u>website</u> on October 1st.

This scholarship is truly a **hidden gem** for women of any age who have returned to college to finish their Associate or Bachelor's degree after a break in their studies. We've made several changes, but the main highlights to note are:

• We've expanded eligibility. Now, eligible applicants can either be attending a AAUW Redlands Partner School (Crafton Hills College, San Bernardino Valley College, University of Redlands) OR living in a AAUW Redlands branch city (including, but not limited to: Banning, Beaumont, Calimesa, Cherry Valley, Colton, Grand Terrace, Highland, Loma Linda, Mentone, Redlands, San Bernardino, and Yucaipa).



- We've increased the award amount. For recipients enrolled in 4-year schools, the award amount has been increased from \$2,000 to \$2,500. For recipients enrolled in 2-year schools, the award amount remains \$1,000, with the goal of awarding at least two.
- We're acknowledging our partner schools. We're reserving at least one scholarship for a qualified applicant at one of our partner schools.
- We have an easier application process. We've replaced the fillable PDF with an online form applicants can use to submit their application and essay (shout-out to member **Kim Cousins** for this!) Applicants will continue to email in their recommendation letters and transcripts.

Our AAUW Redlands Tech Trek Committee is ready to start TECH TREK 2026 and WE NEED NEW MEMBERS! Join us during October Membership Month.

Are you interested in joining our Tech Trek Committee? This is your opportunity! Tech Trek 2026 will begin soon! The Redlands Branch Tech Trek is part of the AAUW CA Tech Trek Program. Tech Trek is a one-week summer camp for middle school girls focusing on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). Campers either attend virtually online or attend in person on a university campus. Tech Trek is an invaluable and rewarding experience for the girls and for our committee members. —continued on page 9

Later this year, our committee members will meet with middle school Counselors at Nicolet (Banning), San Gorgonio (Beaumont), Clement (Redlands) and Park View (Yucaipa) to share information about Tech Trek, and to deliver certificates of achievement to the girls who participated in



Trek Tech 2025. Science teachers at the schools will nominate 7th grade girls whom they believe would benefit from participating in Tech Trek camp, who have displayed an interest in and an eagerness to learn more about STEM subjects. The nominated girls will be invited to complete an online application (consisting of an essay and a questionnaire) and our committee members will work with school personnel to encourage the girls and their families to finalize their applications by the Tech Trek camp deadline.

Our committee will meet to score each applicant on the quality of their essay, individual interest in or experience with STEM, participation in group activities, and interest in learning new things. Last year the essays were inspiring! Applicants will be interviewed by members of our committee. Each girl will be scored on her interest and enthusiasm to learn about or pursue a potential career in STEM, openness to being away from home at camp (without access to their cell phone), and their ability to work well with others and take on new challenges. The girls will also be asked about their preference for virtual or in-person camp. Meeting the girls, listening to their answers, and seeing their enthusiasm is an amazing experience!

Due to the generosity of our donors, we were able to offer twelve girls the opportunity to participate in either virtual or residential camp last year. The selected campers, their families, and our committee members are invited to attend a celebratory pizza party in May where the campers and their parents have the opportunity to meet with Tech Trek alumnae, receive their ESRI-provided backpacks (including an AAUW Tech Trek teddy bear), and ask questions about the camping experience.

NEW DATE for Redlands Conference: Wednesday, February 25, 2026

Here we go! Our branch will carry out our two STEM conferences for 8th grade girls for the 33rd year! The conference for Banning, Hemet and two Yucaipa charter schools will be held at Mt San Jacinto College's San Jacinto Campus on Thursday, January 8, 2026.

The conference for Beaumont, Redlands and Yucaipa-Calimesa schools will be held at the University of Redlands on Wednesday, February 25. Please note that this is a different date than originally published in your new yellow yearbook. (It's complicated!)



These conferences expose our students to a wide range of jobs and careers in STEM REDLANDS BRANCH fields, as well as immerse them in experiences with strong female professionals in STEM. Our goal is that they feel connected enough and confident enough that they will stick with their math and science classes in high school to be prepared for college coursework and new opportunities.

AAUW Redlands Archives...

CHAT (Conversation Helps Adults Transition) Begins:



In 2013, Adult Literacy Volunteer Coordinators Katherine Gifford and Trudy Waldron noticed how many adults who had immigrated from across the world to our area were asking for adult literacy assistance because they needed help with their conversational English. While very well educated in their home countries, these adults needed to gain new confidence to get jobs and advance their U.S. education. Many had already completed or were too advanced for the English as a Second Language Program

offered by the Redlands Adult School.

The volunteer tutors with the Redlands Adult Literacy Program at A.K. Smiley Public Library are trained to assist adult learners -- many without even a high school degree -- to develop reading and writing, not to be English conversational partners. Seeking volunteer support, Katherine and Trudy approached the then-AAUW president, Kathy Toister, who was immediately receptive to forming a program called CHAT (Conversation Helps Adults Transition.) Volunteer CHAT partners (CHATors) would be drawn from AAUW membership to help well-educated women wanting to improve their conversational English (CHATees).

How It Works:

Immigrants seeking help with English meet with Diane Shimota, the adult literacy coordinator at Smiley Library. When Diane identifies a person who is well-educated and has strong language skills, she refers them to CHAT. Trudy and Katherine continue to meet with these candidates to find out about their interests and explain the CHAT program. Then they call on AAUW volunteers to see if they are willing to meet with a CHAT partner at their convenience to help them gain conversational skills. The few men who have been referred to CHAT



usually meet separately, though on occasion they have met with the larger CHAT group.

A typical monthly meeting begins with an icebreaker, and then the day's topic is introduced. Trudy leads everyone through a list of common idioms related to that topic, promoting a lively discussion of those words and other expressions that can be difficult. Any AAUW member can attend the monthly meetings; you don't have to already have a CHATee!

CHATees have assisted at STEM conferences, visited museums, written a cookbook, and participated in a writing class. Most importantly, CHAT has been a great way for all members to learn about other cultures and develop deep friendships. Over 15 countries have had members in CHAT. Some CHATees have been in the program for more than 10 years, others have moved back to their home countries but still stay in touch. Since 2013, the CHAT program has helped over 120 people.

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HERstory - Jane Roberts



One Woman, 34 Million Friends: The Life and Legacy of Jane Roberts

Jane Roberts is proof that one kind, strong, and determined woman can make a real difference. The co-founder of 34 Million Friends of the Women of the World and a 2005 Nobel Peace Prize nominee, Jane has spent her life turning privilege into purpose and outrage into action.

Born in 1941 in San Diego, Jane grew up in a household immersed in learning. Her father was a professor of English at San Diego State University, her mother a science and math teacher. "We were privileged," Jane recalls, "and with that came a sense of responsibility."

She was shy as a child but found her confidence on the tennis court. Family friend Billie Jean King left a lasting impression. Jane admired her lifelong fight for women's equality in sports.

A Life in Languages and Love

Her passion for French started early, in High School. It only grew when her family spent a year in France during her father's sabbatical. She went on to earn a degree in French at San Diego State, then an M.A. in Paris, where she wrote her thesis on philosopher Blaise Pascal. Her waltz with religious belief began early.

In 1964, Jane joined the University of Redlands as a French instructor. There, she met Julian "Jay" Roberts, a chemistry professor. It was love at first sight, her youthful smile tells us, remembering the poems they once exchanged. The couple married within a year and built a family that included their son Jeff, adopted in 1974, and daughter Annie, born two years later.

From Teacher to Activist

Jane balanced part-time teaching with raising her children and a growing political voice. She attended the first March for Women's Lives in the late 1970s and later returned to teaching full-time at Eisenhower High School in Rialto, where she saw firsthand how teenage motherhood disrupted students' lives.

By the time she and Jay retired in 1998, Jane had shifted her focus from domestic battles over reproductive rights to global issues of population and women's health. She taught one of the first feminist courses at the University of Redlands, served as president of the Redlands Democratic Club, and became a public policy chair with AAUW Redlands. "These ideas of having the world get serious about its women and girls had been maturing for over 35 years," she says.

Outrage at 3 a.m.

The turning point came in 2002. When the George W. Bush administration blocked \$34 million in congressionally approved funding to the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), Jane could not sleep. At 3 a.m., an idea struck: What if 34 million Americans gave just one dollar each?

Her letter to the editor of the *San Bernardino Sun* made a simple plea: "As an exercise in outraged democracy, would 34 million of my fellow citizens please join me by sending one dollar each to the U.S. Committee for UNFPA?"

She mailed her own check — and a single dollar bill — to start the effort. Partnering with New Mexico attorney Lois Abraham, Jane launched *34 Million Friends*. Soon, envelopes flooded UNFPA's offices. Staff gave up lunch hours to process donations, until staff was assigned to support the effort. Within a year, the campaign had raised \$1 million.

By 2020, 34 Million Friends had raised more than \$7.8 million, money that helped fund maternal care in Africa, prevent unwanted pregnancies, and save lives. A hospital in Mali even built a new operating room to treat obstetric fistula patients, funded by Jane and Lois' grassroots movement.

A Nobel Nomination and a Lasting Voice

In 2005, UNESCO nominated Jane among "1000 Women for the Nobel Peace Prize," recognizing women whose nonviolent work often goes unnoticed. She published a book to spread her message further, traveled to at least 18 states and five countries, and became a sought-after speaker at universities and conferences.

A Nobel Nomination and a Lasting Voice

Quotes that have inspired her include:

- "When the world takes care of women, women take care of the world."
- "Feminism is wonderful. It is simply the belief that men and women are human beings together."

Even now, Jane writes sharp, satirical essays with titles like "God and Men Behaving Badly" and "Atheism: The Last Closet."

Privilege, Responsibility, and Legacy

Now nearly 84, Jane lives in Redlands in a retirement community, still active in her book club and email circle of friends. She lost Jay in 2019 but finds joy in her daughter Annie's daily calls, in making breakfast, conversations with friends that drop by, reading good books and in the poems, she wrote decades ago on her way home from Africa. Phrases in her favorite poem bring tears to her eyes and weaken her voice.

She defines her legacy in three words: **Dedication, Education, and Privilege**. Not privilege as guilt, but as responsibility. "Go for it," she advises younger women. "Don't get sidetracked. Don't worry about failing. If you worry about failing, you're never going to do anything."

From a restless night in Redlands to saving lives across the globe, Jane Roberts has shown what one person's outrage — and courage — can achieve. She may call herself simply "privileged," but history will remember her as a friend to millions.
